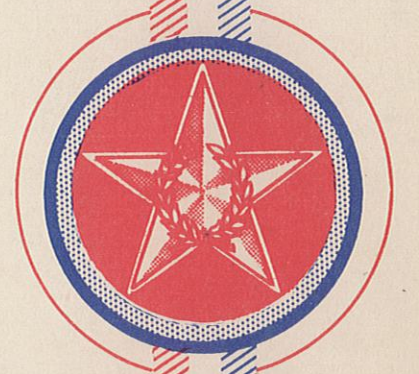
We wish to pay tribute to our former classmate, Bonnie Miller who passed away November 13, 1944, due to fatal burns received on New Years Eve of 1943.
