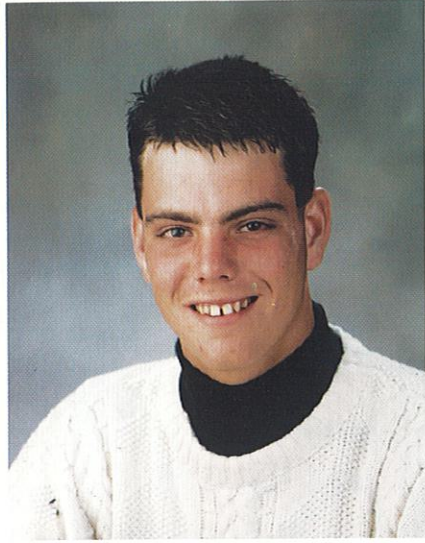
Top News Stories of 1992

1. Defeating President George Bush and Independent Ross Perot, Bill Clinton was elected the 42nd President of the U.S. Democrats retained control of the House and Senate, as four women won their senate races, including two in California and the black women senator in Illinois.

Must have passport

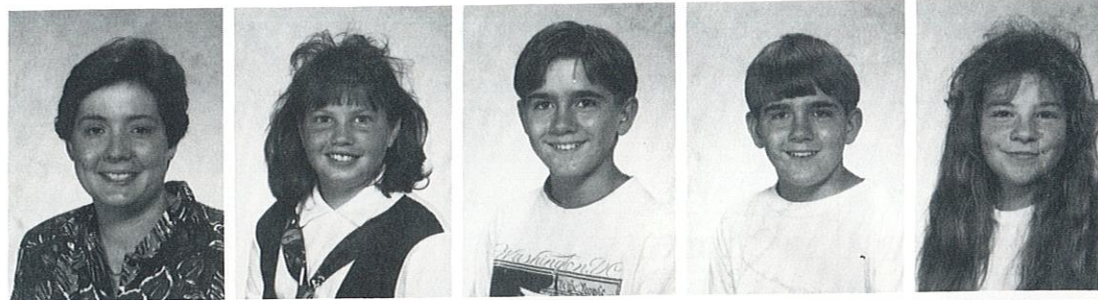

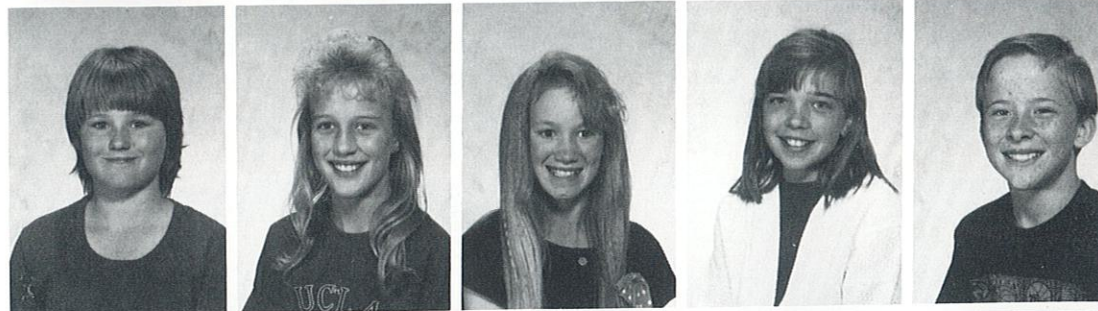

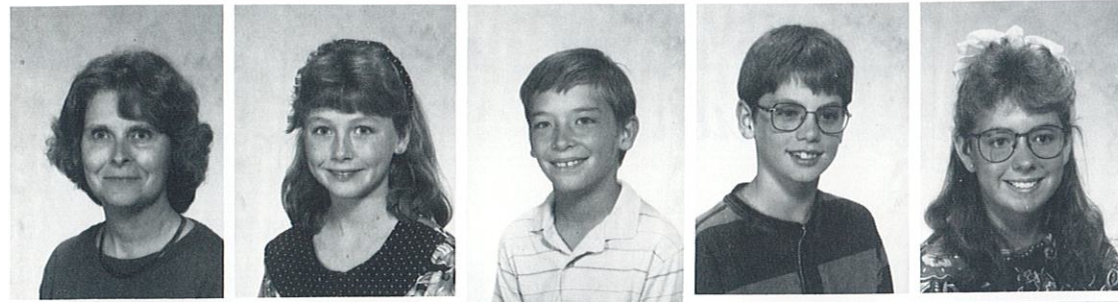

1992 was a very memorable year in sports. The year saw champions crowned in many different sports from the Olympics to major league baseball and saw the passings and retirements of some great players.

The Miami Hurricanes and Washington Huskies kicked off the year by winning the college football national championship. This was followed by the Washington Redskins whipping the Buffalo Bills 37-24 in Superbowl XXVII in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The Winter Olympics were held in Albertville, France. Germany won the most medals, followed by the Unified Team, Austria, and Norway. The United States finished with only 11 medals-5 gold, 4 silver, and 2 bronze. The Duke Blue Devils won their second straight NCAA College Basketball title in March by defeating Michigan 71-51. The Chicago Bulls also won their second straight NBA championship by beating the Portland Trail Blazers in six games. The Summer Olympics were held in Barcelona, Spain. The Unified Team won the most medals with 112, followed by the United States with 108. The U.S.A. won 37 gold, 34 silver, 37 bronze. This fall, the Toronto Blue Jays became the first Canadian team to win the World Series. They defeated the Atlanta Braves four games to two. The Pittsburgh Penguins defeated the Chicago Blackhawks four games to none to win their second straight Stanley Cup. The sports year ended with Riddick Bowe defeating Evander Holyfield for the heavyweight boxing title.

1992 also saw the retirement and re-retirement of two of basketball's greatest players, Larry Bird and Magic Johnson. Magic was attempting to make a comeback after he retired a year ago when he tested positive for HIV. The players' fear of his disease drove Magic to retire for good after the Olympics and before the start of the NBA season. Pro football also lost five players to retirement. Anthony Munoz, Lawrence Taylor, and Mike Singletary all called it quits after long and illustrative careers. Mike Utley and Dennis Byrd were forced to retire after they were paralyzed in separate games last season. Football also lost another star when Jerome Brown was killed in a car accident in July.

1992 also saw some lofty goals obtained and records fall. Washington Redskins' wide receiver, Art Monk, became the all-time reception leader in the NFL, breaking the old record held by Steve Largent. In major league baseball, the Milwaukee Brewers' Robin Yount and the Kansas City Royals' George Brett both reached the 3000 hit club.

1992 will long be remembered as a year full of lasting memories in the world of sports.

The boys received a bye in the first round of district play. Their next opponents were Marion County. Marion County fell to the first seed Brashear Tigers and the Tigers continued on with district play against second seed LaPlata. The hard fought game found the Brashear Tigers with a one run deficit and LaPlata became the district champions.

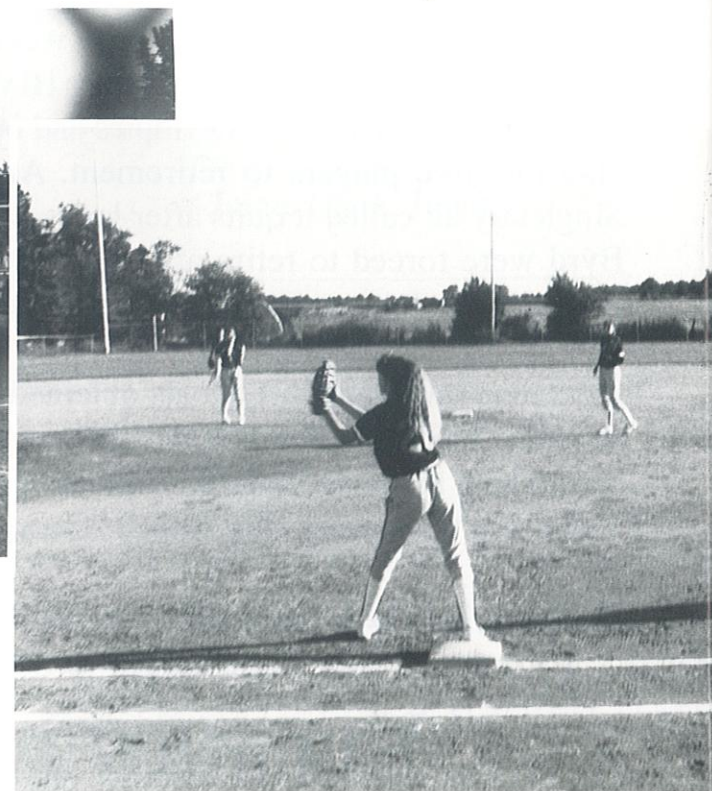


Above: Senior Justin Coy connects for an RBI double against LaPlata.

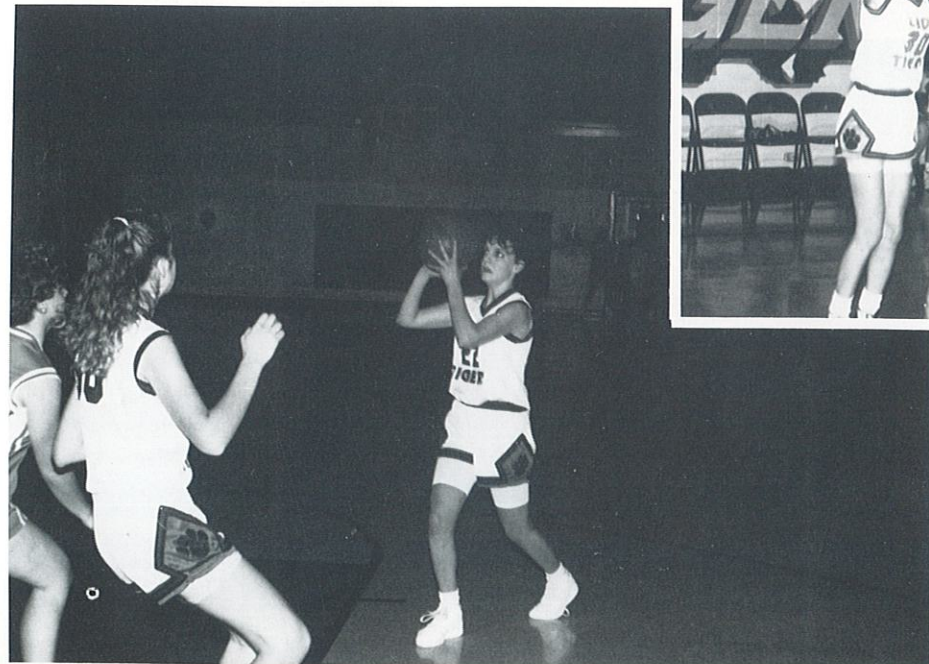

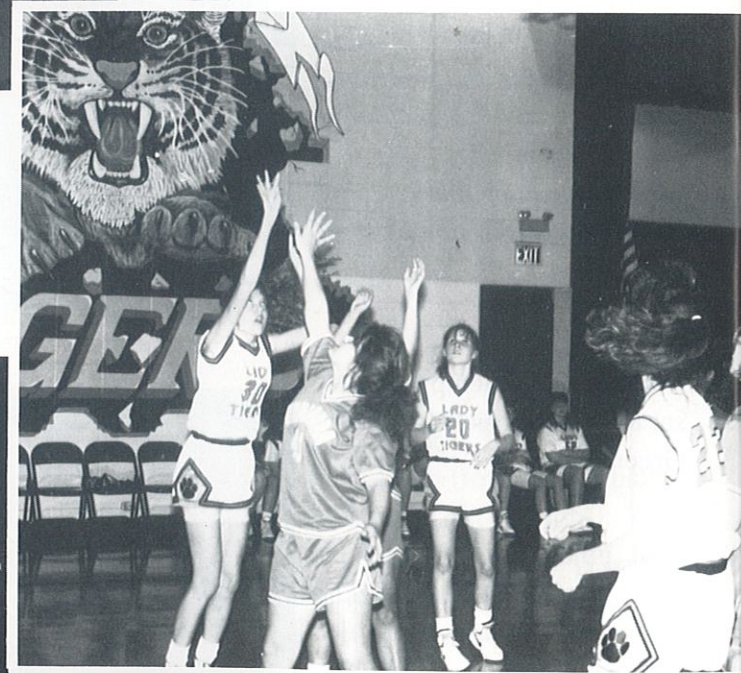


Above: Jaime Clark puts up a lay up against Atlanta.

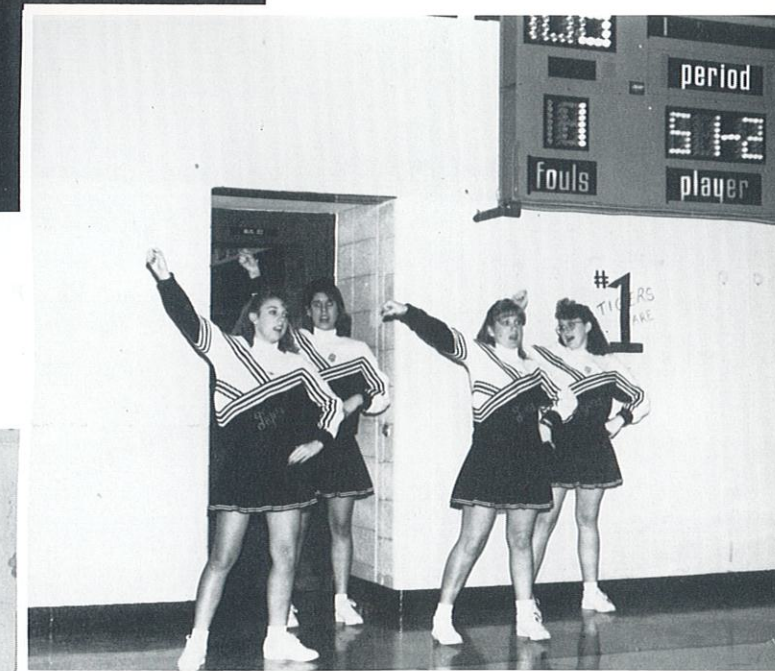

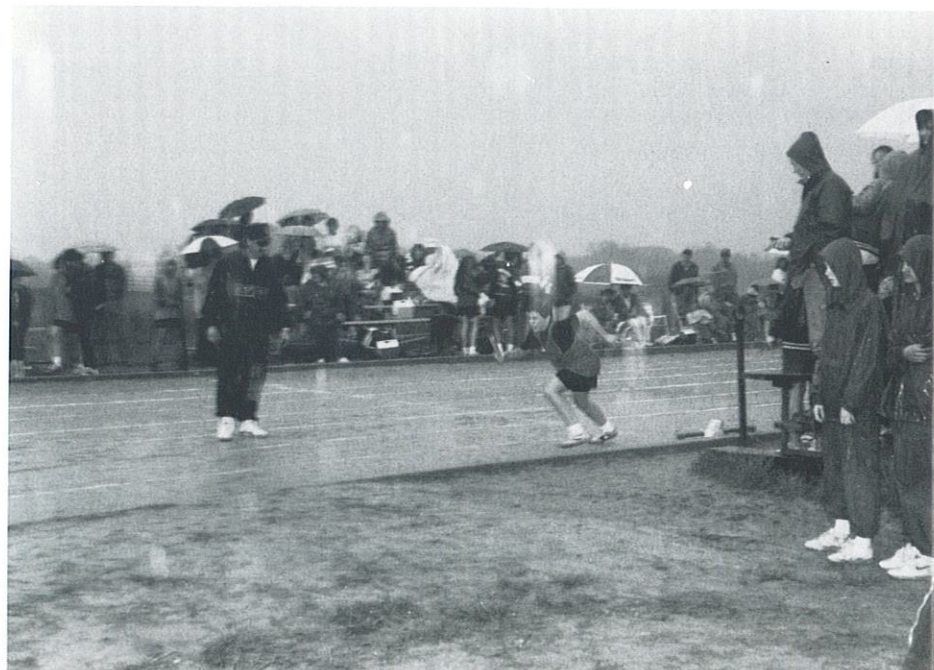

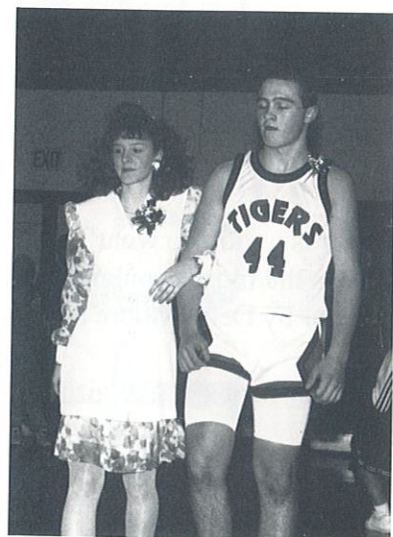

Show school spirit

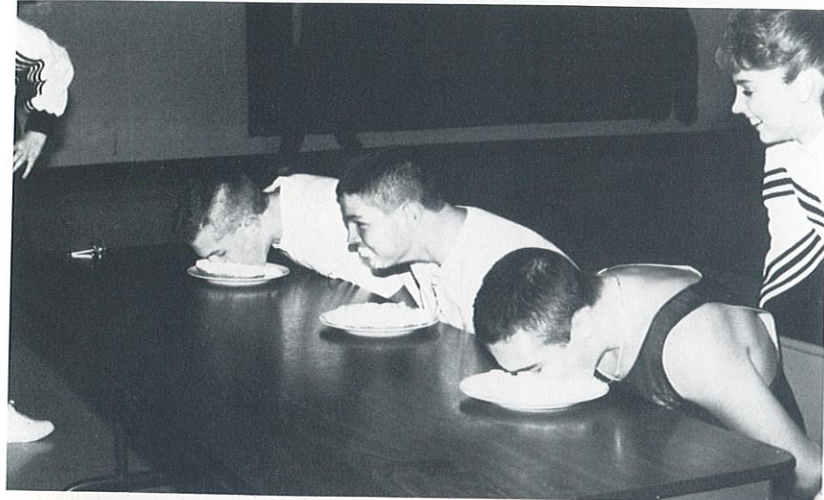
The pep rally was held on Monday, November 23 in the high school gym. The cheerleaders conducted several events to kick-off the basketball season.

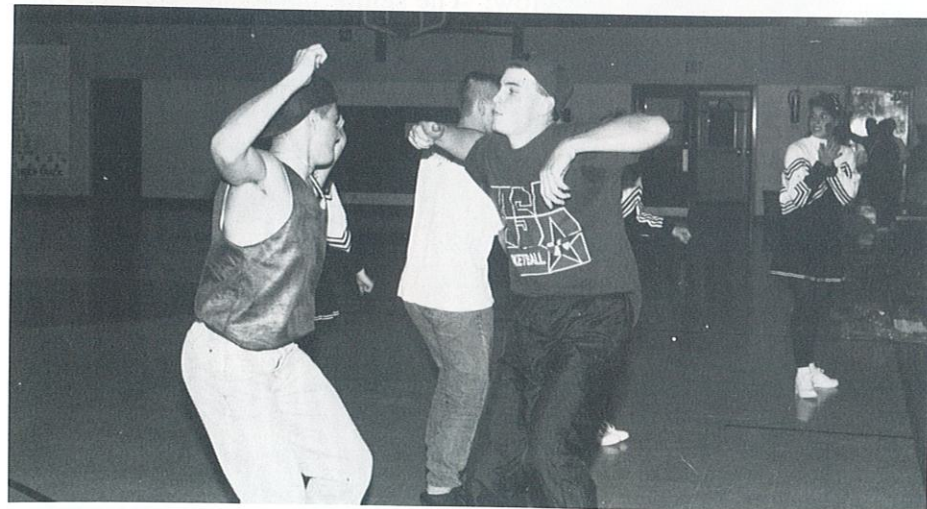

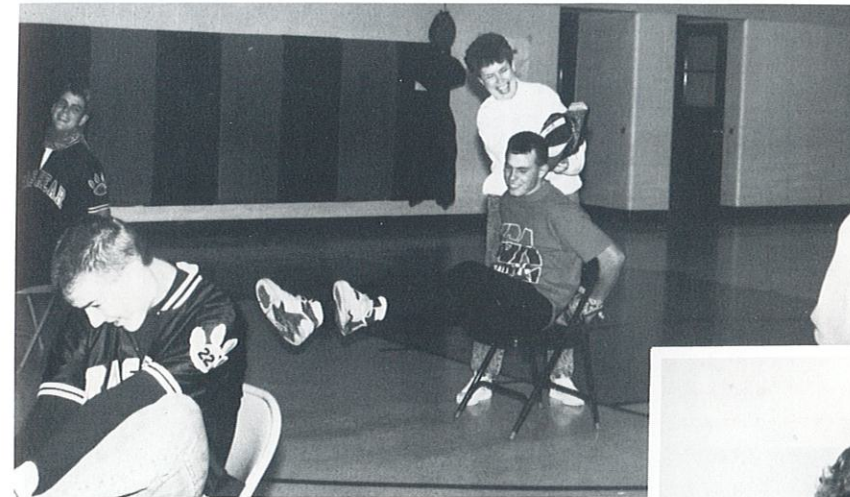
Refreshments for the evening were hot dogs, chips, and orange drink. The food for the evening was provided by the student council, cheerleaders and volunteers from the student body.

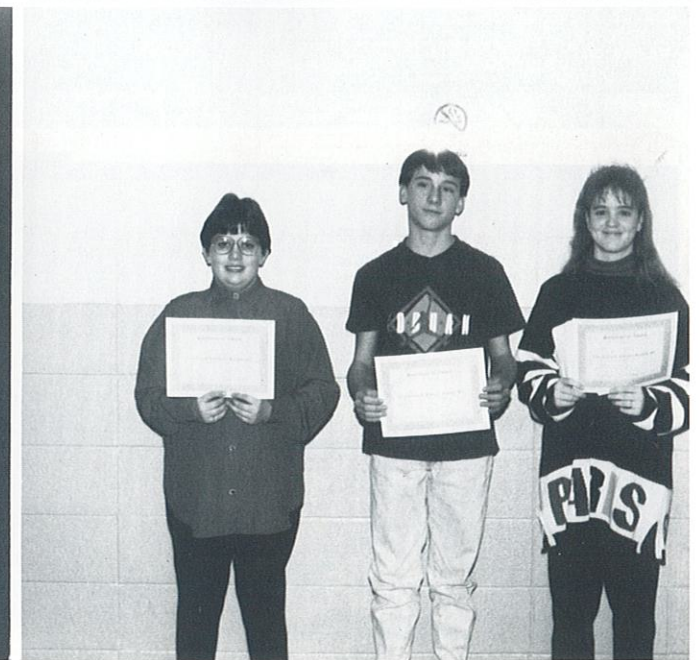

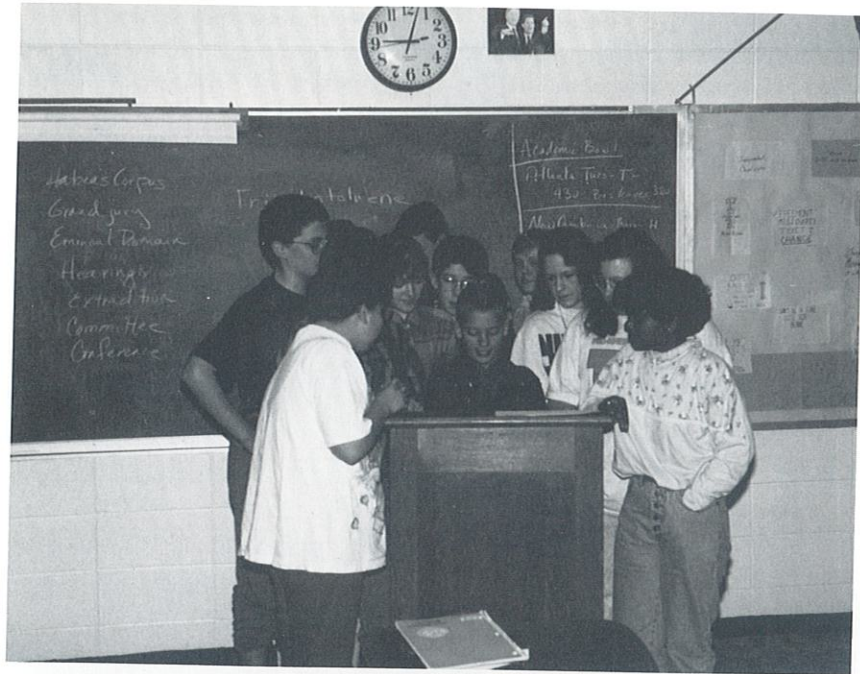

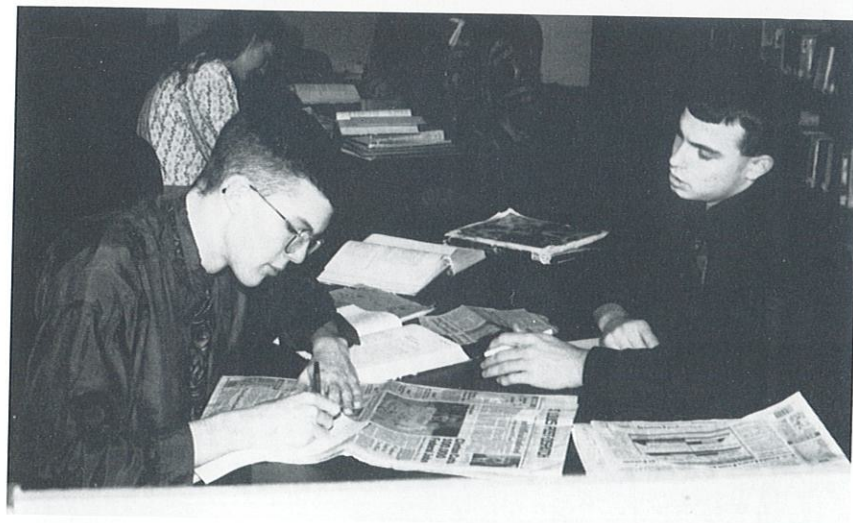

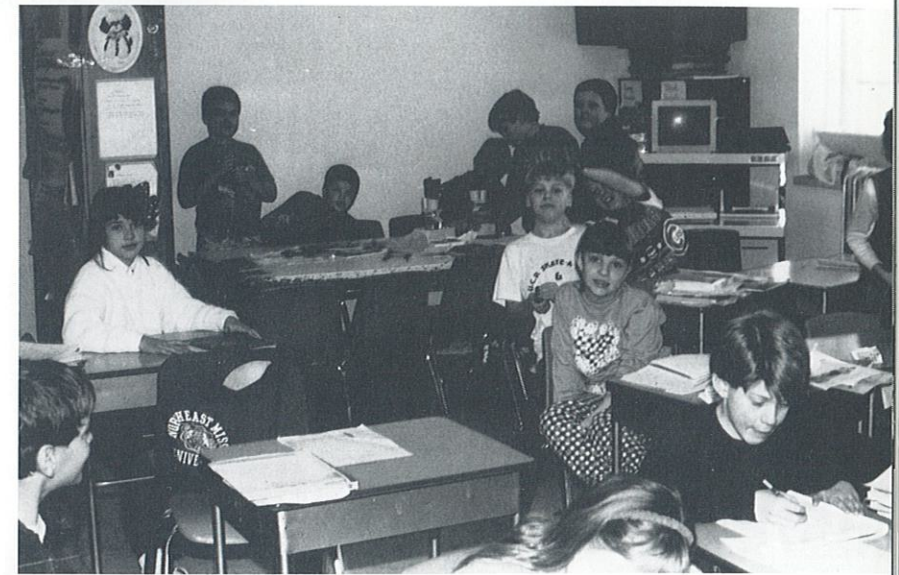

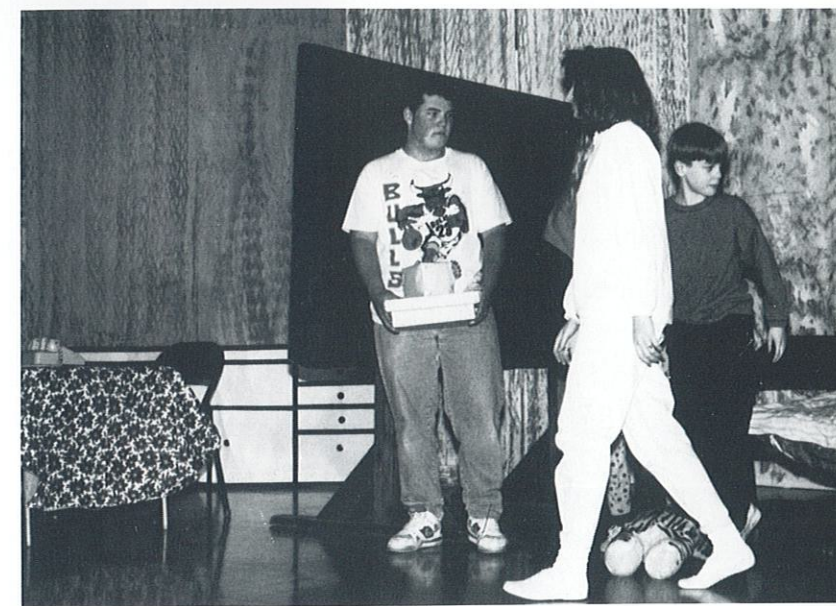

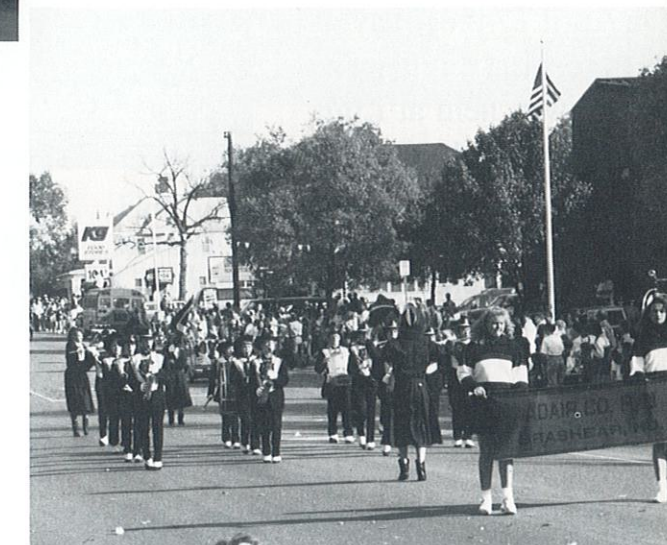

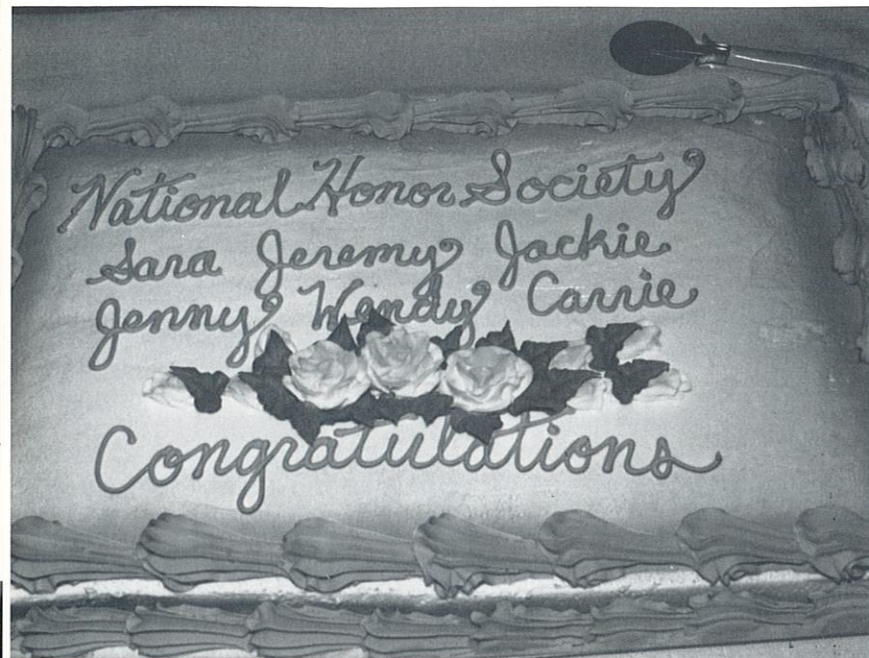
