

The high school boys and girls track teams have had a great season this year. Many school records have been broken and two golden shoes along with many meets have been won.


The girls track team has received first place in the Linn Co. Relays, second place in the Scotland Co. Relays, second place in the North Shelby Relays, second place in the NEMO Relays, first place in the Linn Co. All Relays, second place in the Conference Relays, first place in the Green City Relays, and second place in the District Relays. Jaime Clark received two golden shoes: one in the Linn Co. Relays, and one in the Conference Relays.

The boys track team has received third place in the Linn Co. Relays, third place in the Scotland Co. Relays, third place in the North Shelby Relays, they tied for fourth place in the NEMO Relays, fifth place in the Linn Co. All Relays, fourth place in the Conference Relays, fourth place in the Green City Relays, and second place in the District Relays.

Many of the Brashear team qualified for the state meet this year. The girls' state qualifiers were Jaime Clark in the 100 and 200 meter dashs, and the long jump, Kelly Aldridge in the 800 meter run, Krista Aldridge in the 400 meter dash, Wendy Williams in the 200 meter dash and the 300 meter low hurdles, the 3200 meter relay consisting of Kelly Aldridge, Krista Aldridge, Carrie Erwin, and Ashley Davison, the 1600 meter relay made up of Kelly and Krista Aldridge, Wendy Williams, and Ashley Davison, and the 800 meter relay team consisting of Jaime Clark, Wendy Williams, and Kelly and Krista Aldridge. The boys' state qualifiers were Monty Platz in the 800 and 1600 meter runs, Jeremy Sykes in the 3200 meter run, the 3200 meter relay made up of Jeremy Sykes, Monty Platz, David Cameron, and Burnie Schneiderheinze, and the 1600 meter relay consisting of Aaron Zentz, Nathan Selby, Monty Platz, and Jason Williams.

At the state competition the team finished thirteenth, and many medals were won. Jaime Clark placed seventh in the 100 meter dash and third in the long jump, Kelly Aldridge placed seventh in the 800 meter run, Wendy Williams received seventh place in the 200 meter dash. The girls' 3200 meter relay team placed fifth, their 1600 meter relay team received sixth place, and their 800 meter relay team placed eighth. Monty Platz finished fourth in his 800 meter run.




The pep rally was held Monday, November 22, in the high school gym. The cheerleaders conducted several events to kick-off the basketball season.



The skits end with "Grease", which includes a short dance routine and slumber party.








