


Third Grade Happenings
















Above: All-conference sophomore point guard Karissa Salter falls while at play against the Atlanta Hornets. Karissa ended the year with a total of 94 steals.


Right: Sophomore forward Brittany Selby shoots a free-throw while playing at Green City. Brittany averaged 38% from the free-throw line.




Above: Varsity boys place second in the Milan Tournament. The boys lose to Putnam Co. Midgets with a score of 46 to 57.




































