Fifth Grade Plan Math Afternoon





Both classes enjoyed particpating in Reading Week and Random Acts of Kindness Week. During these two weeks, the classes participated in fun learning activities everyday.





There were many memorable moments in the thirteen years.





If That's What It Takes
















