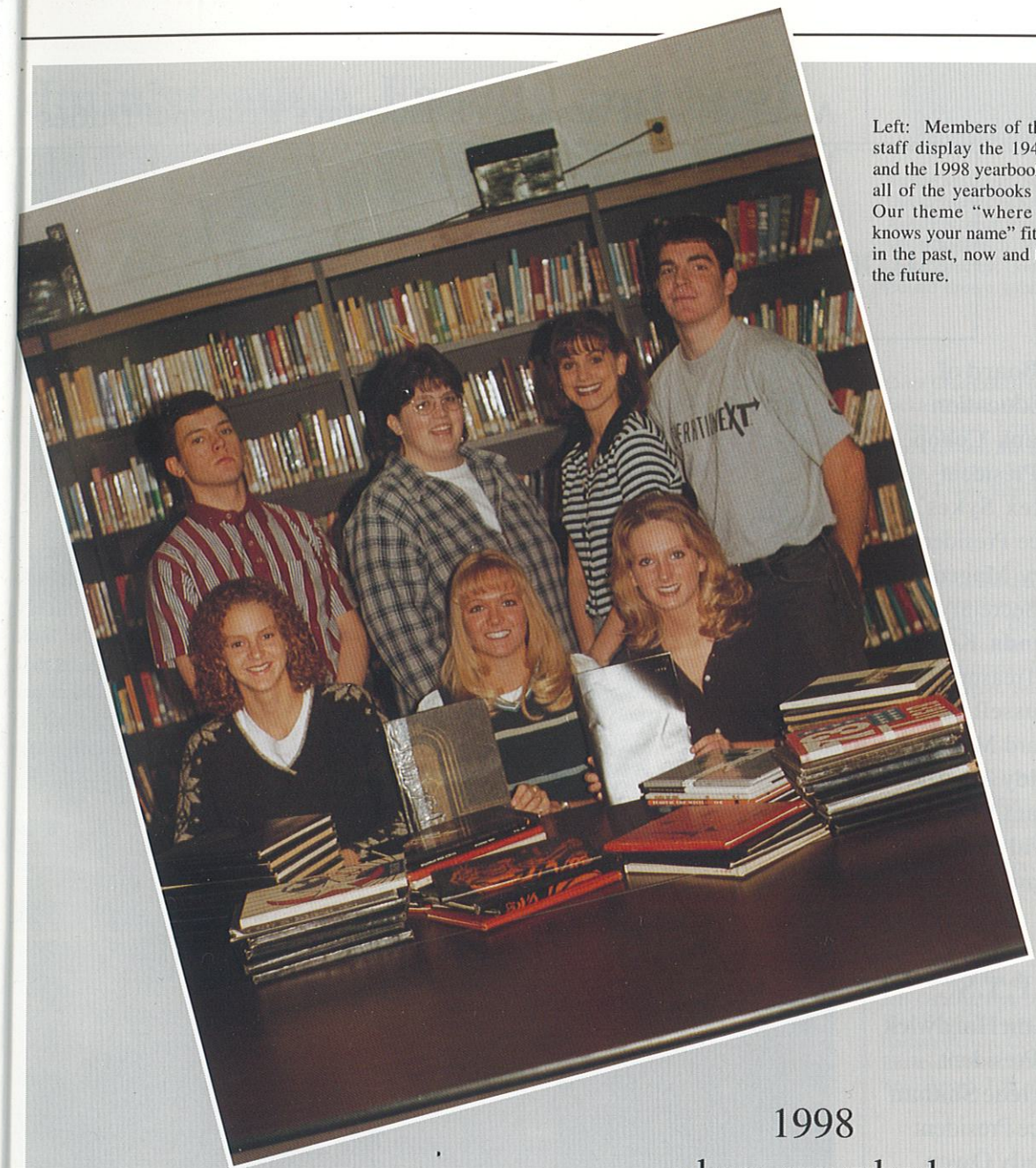

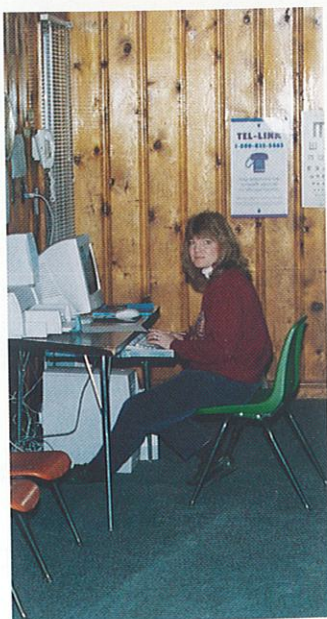
Former fourth grade teacher Ann DeRosear assumed the elementary principal position. Second

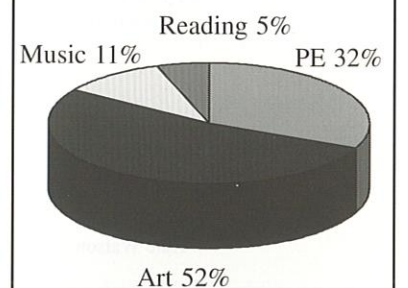

The second grade worked hard on keeping the playground cleaned up this year.

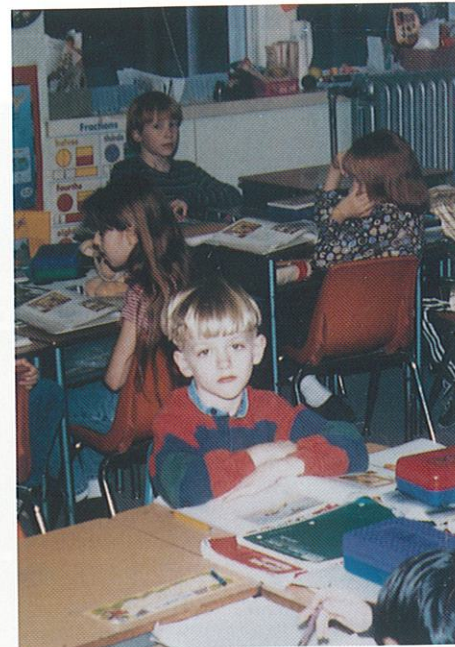
They went on a field trip to Twin Pines and to Kirksville Library. They also wrote to the people in Twin Pines as pen pals.

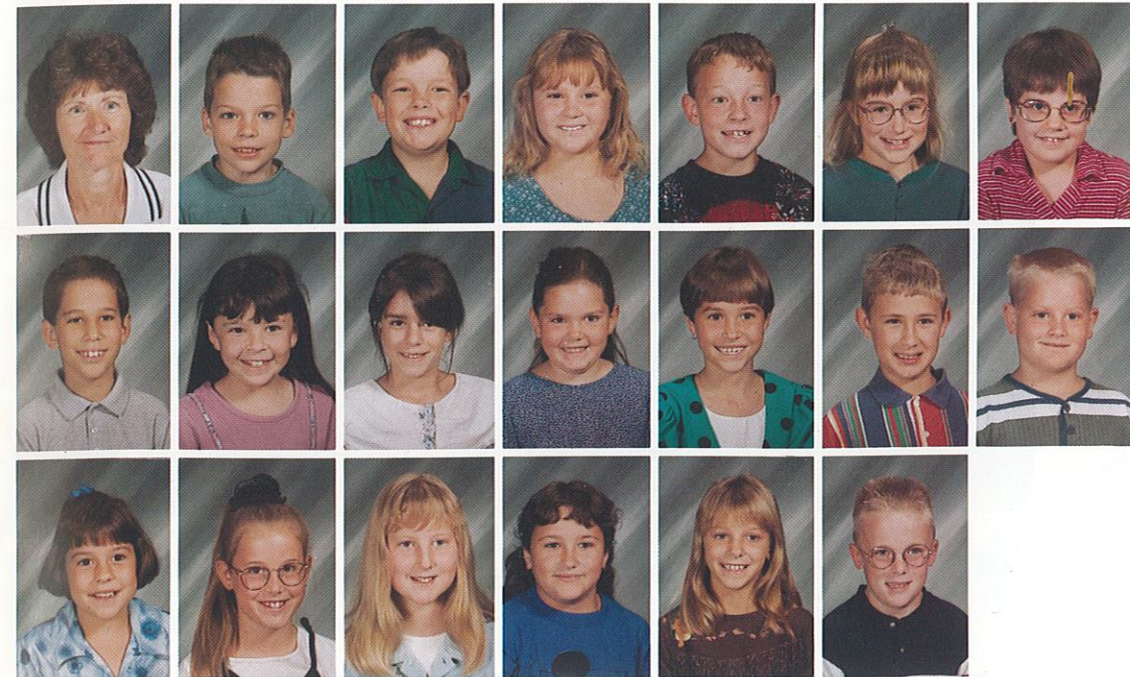

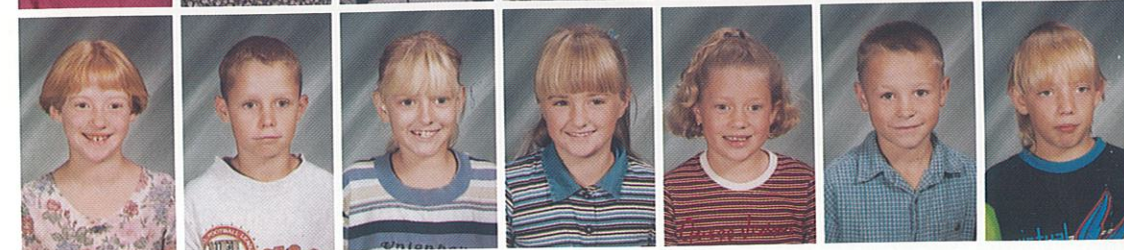

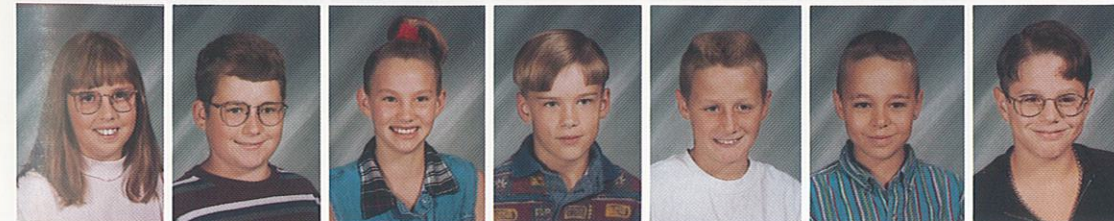
The fifth grade has been very busy this year. They have participated in the DARE program, beginning band, basketball, drama club, gifted program and reading week.

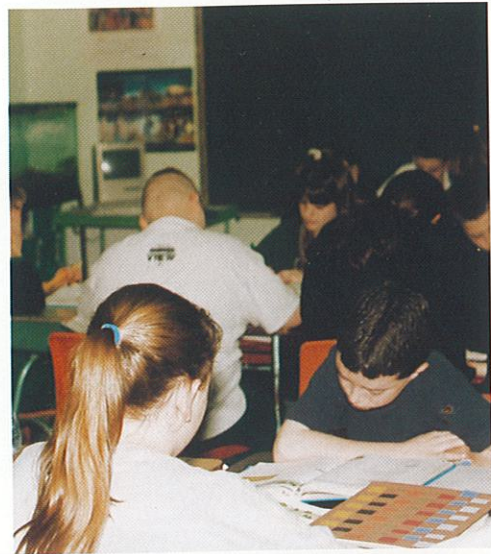
The sixth grade class also read literature sets. They also learned about computer CD programs such as typing, simulation games, and math mystery games.

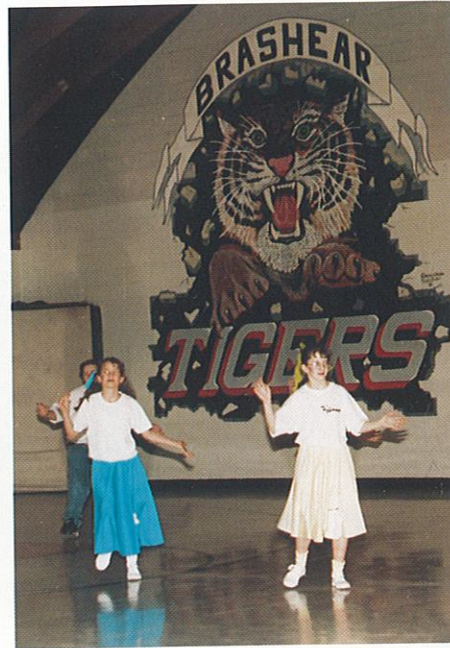

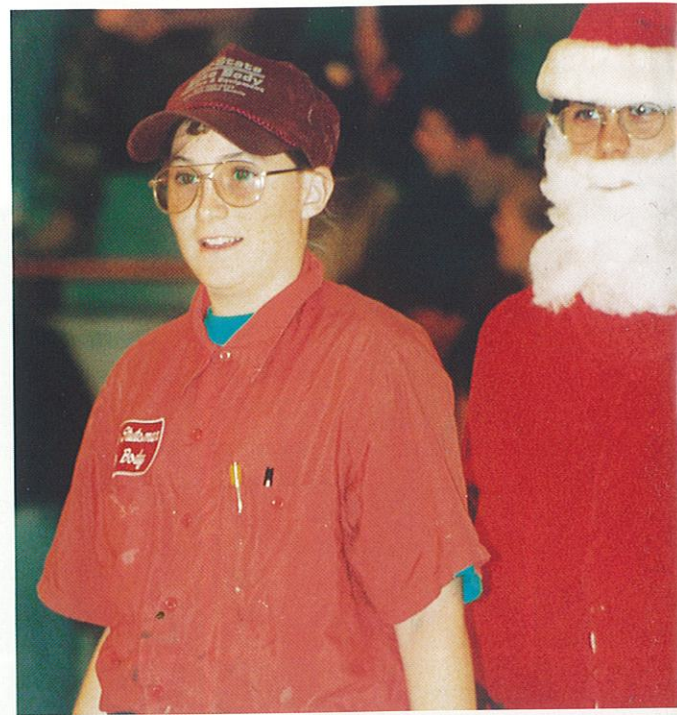

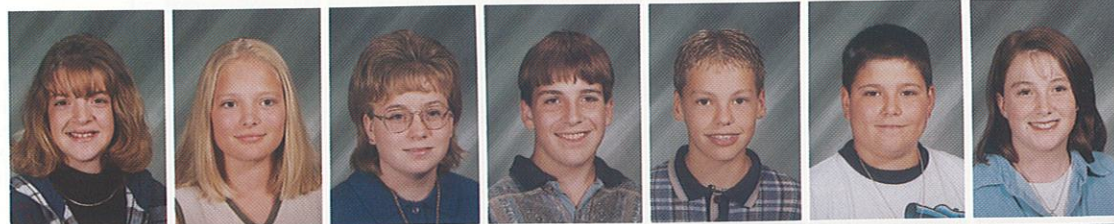

There were few casualties over the years past, but according to Amber Dailing everything in Brashear is a casualty. Many experienced things such as breaking their fingers and naming them Guido.

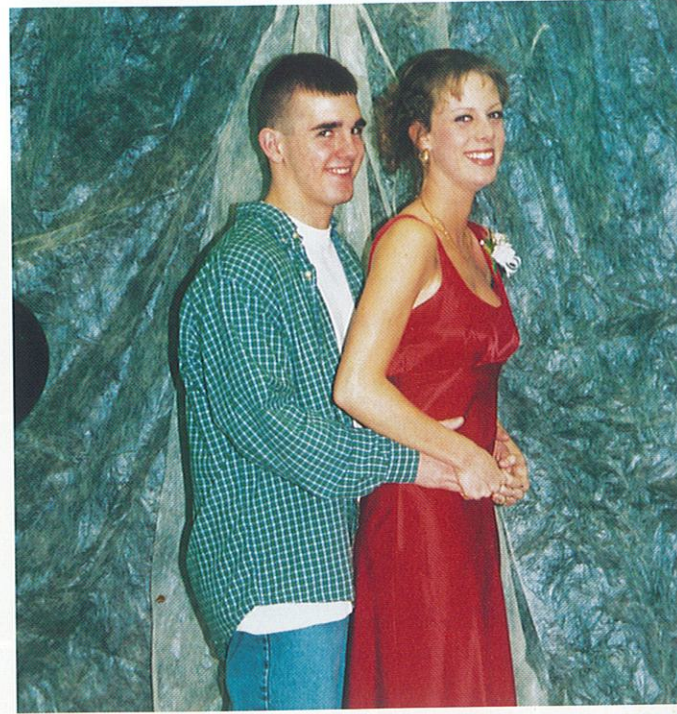

Gregory and Hettinger Prom Queen and King

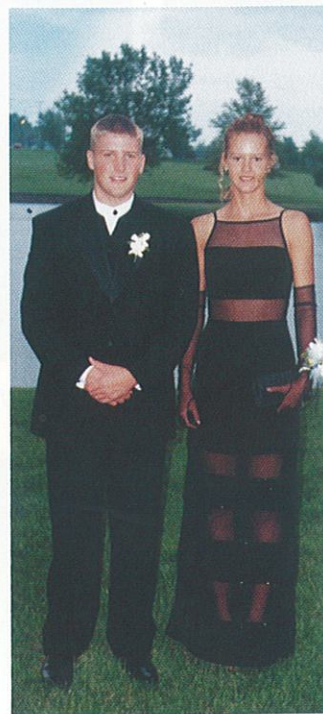

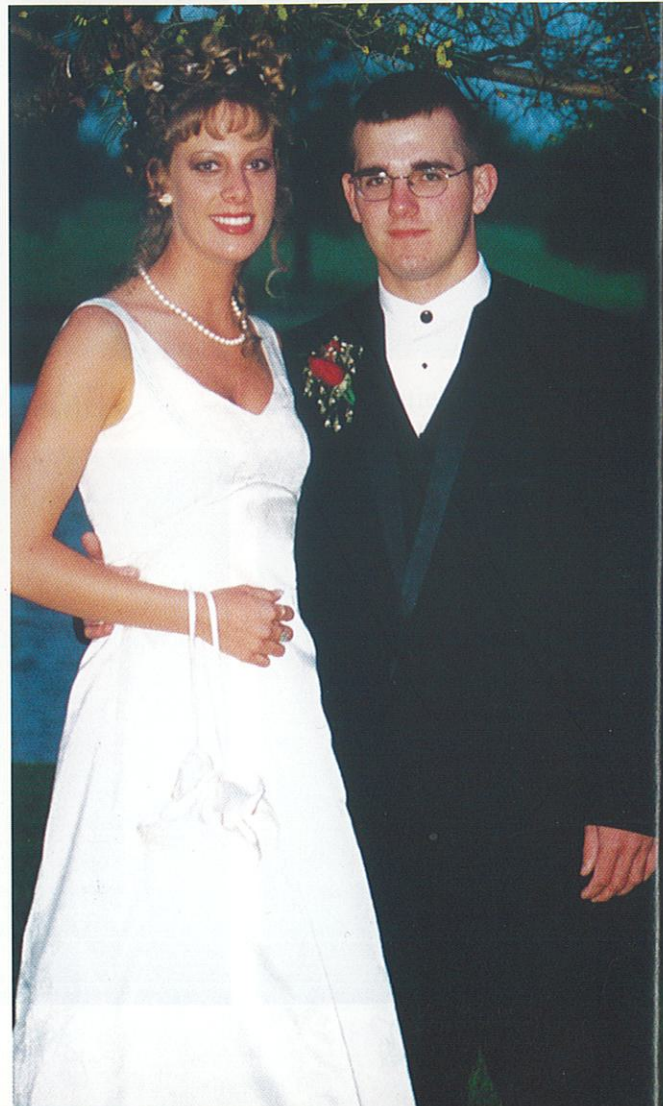

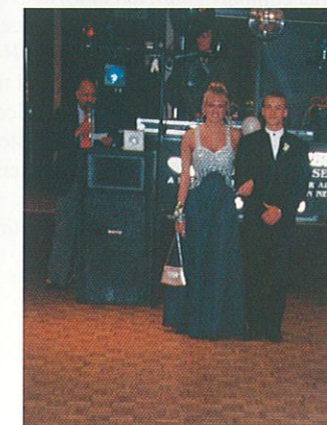

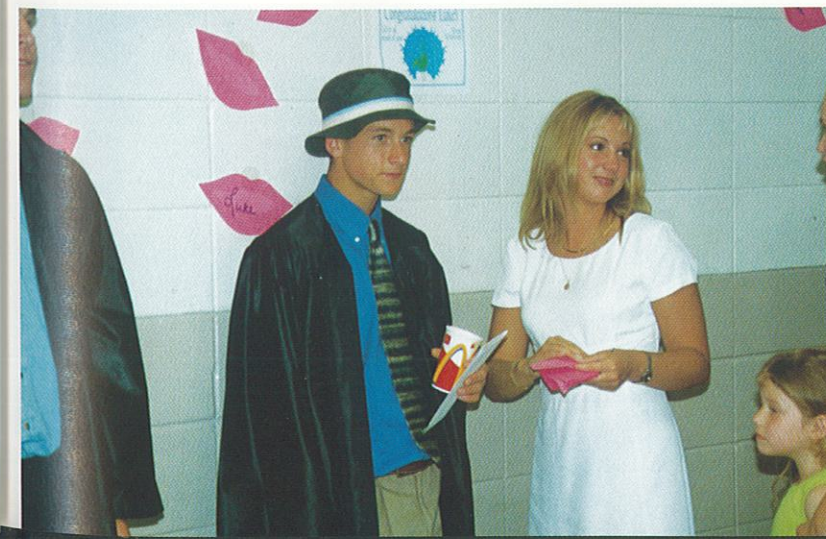

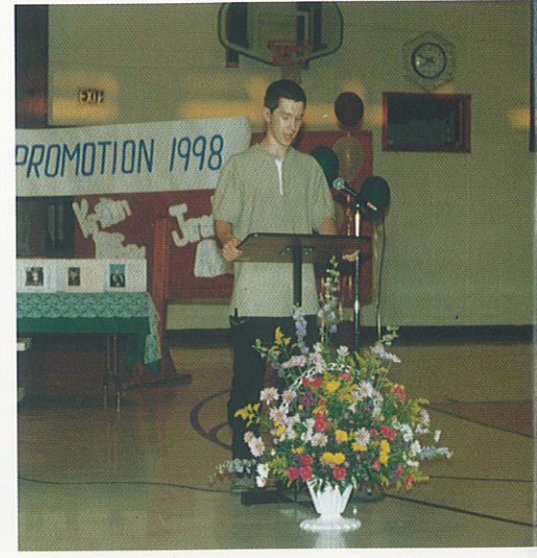

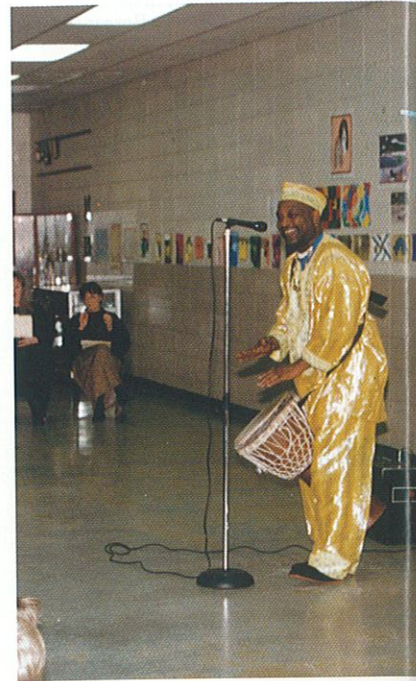
ELEMENTARY HAPPENINGS

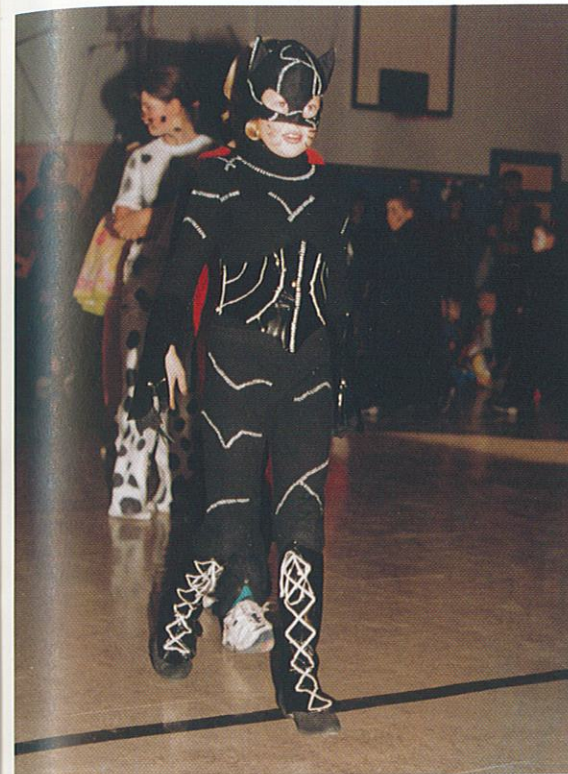


Elementary Happenings

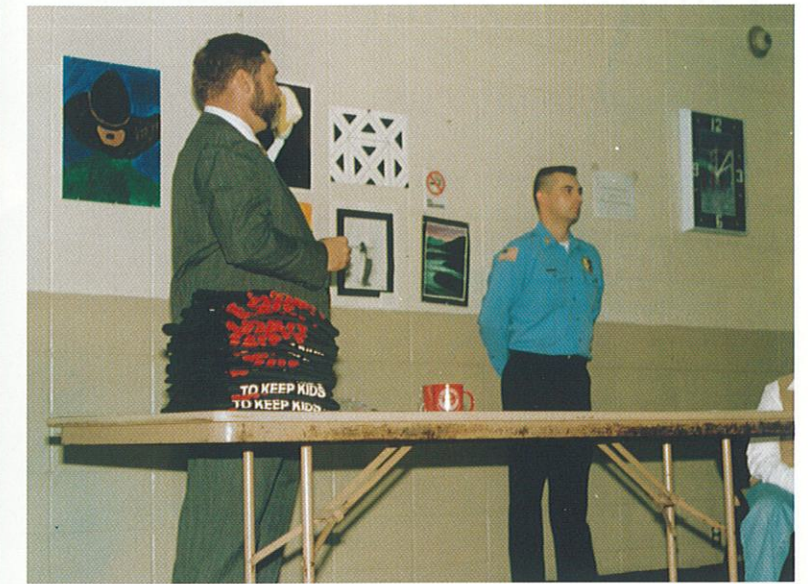

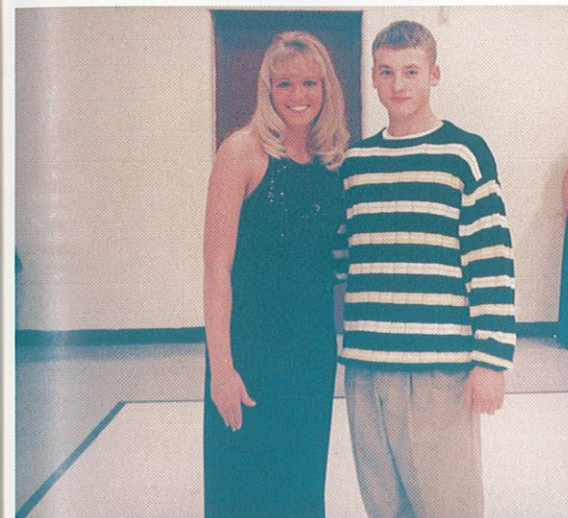

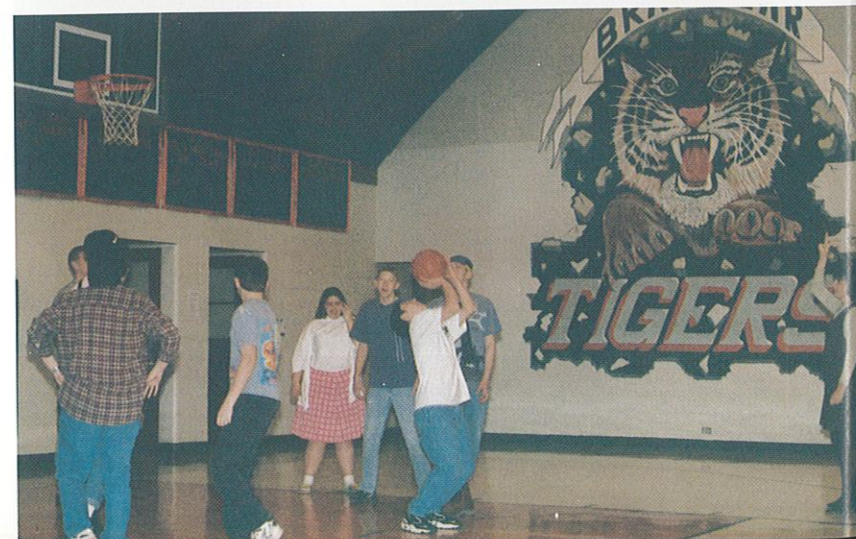

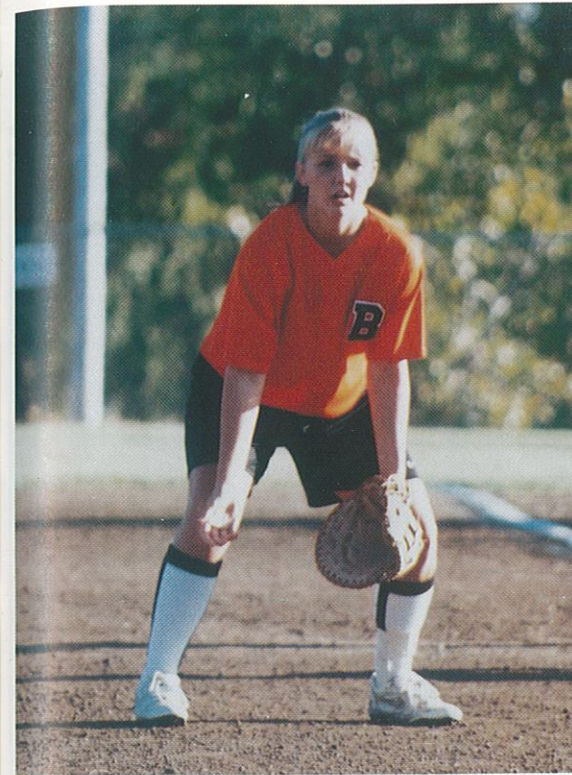
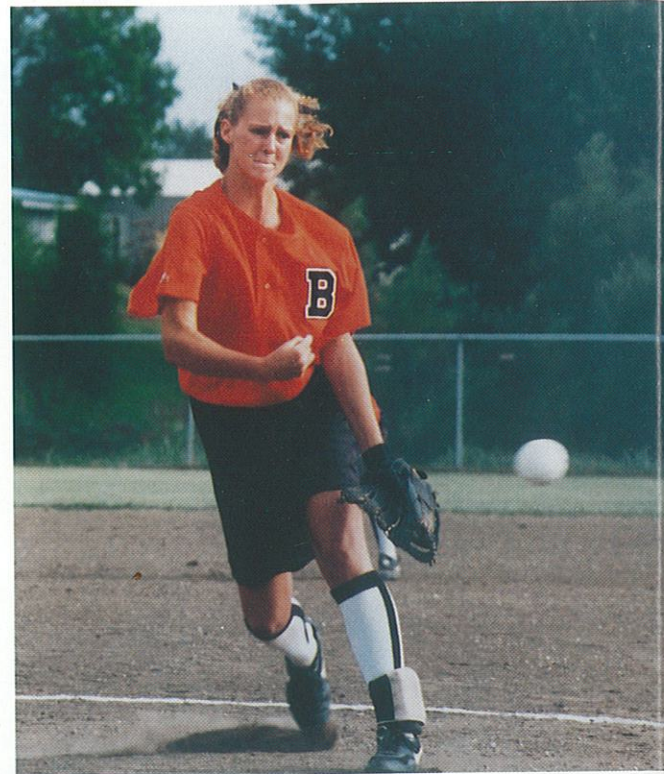
Girls finish 6-2 in conference

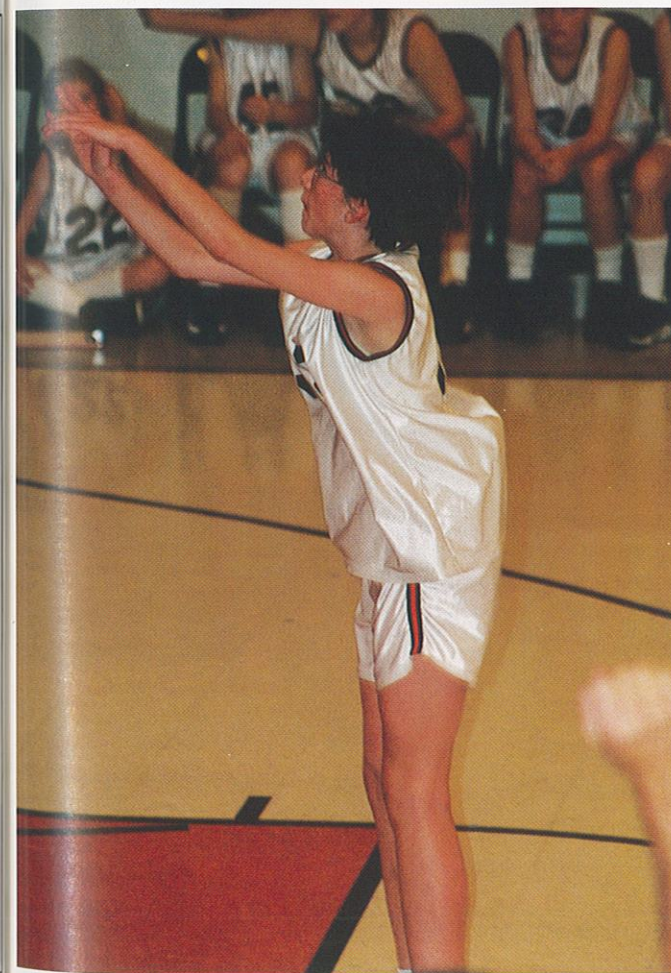

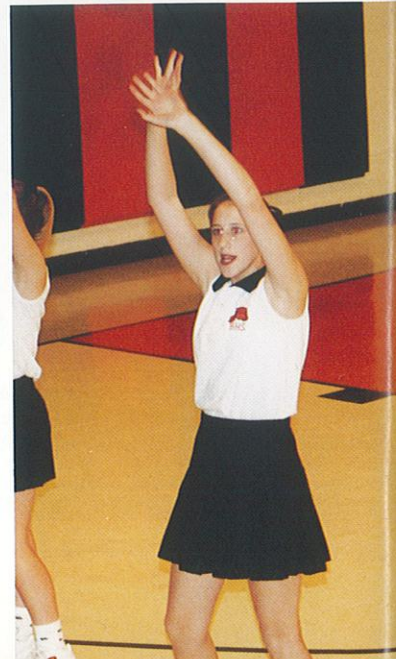

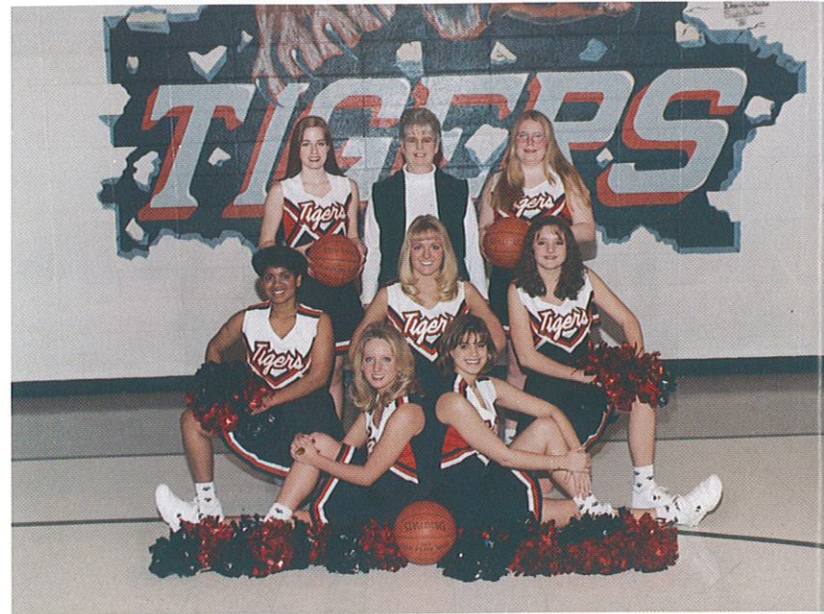

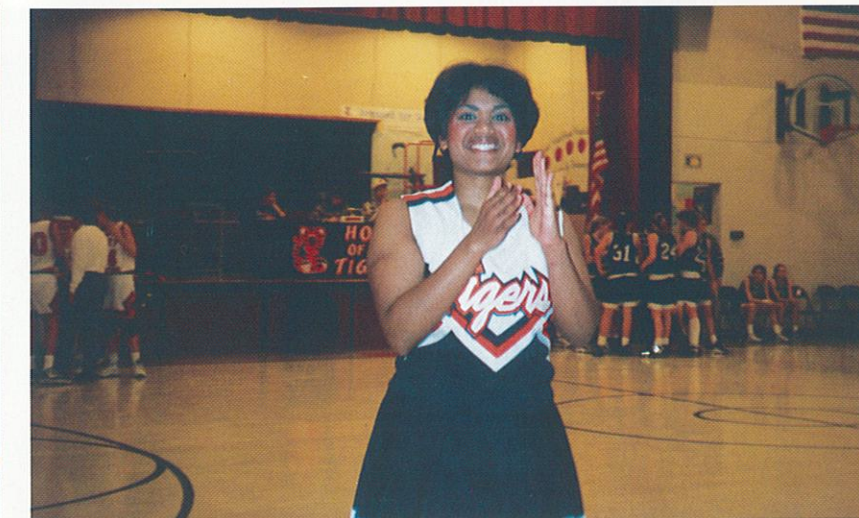

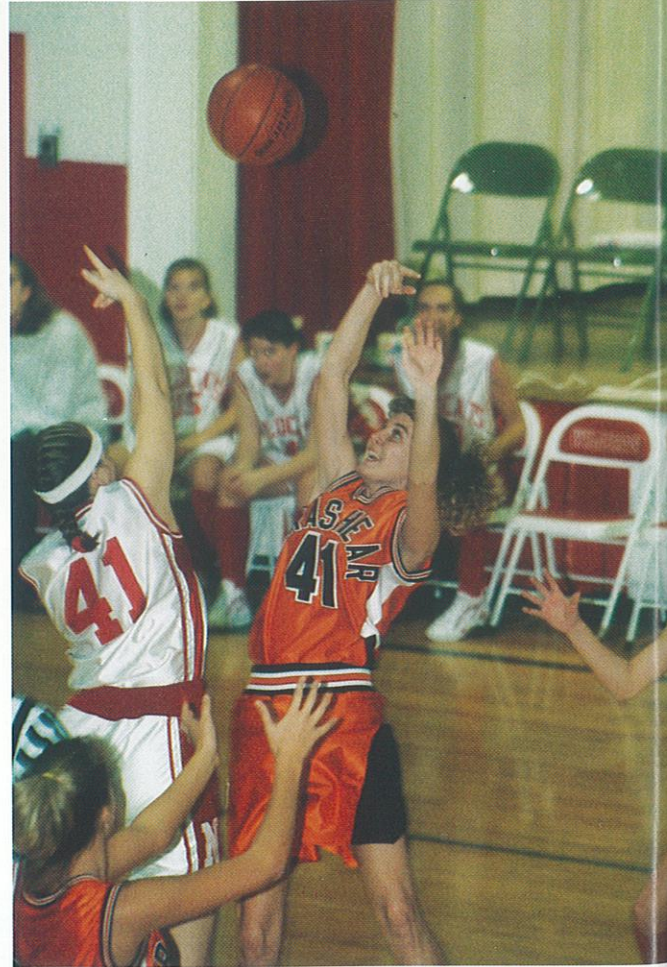

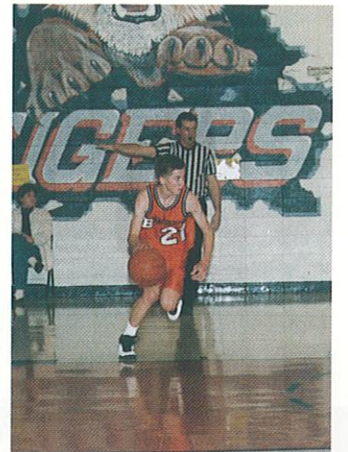

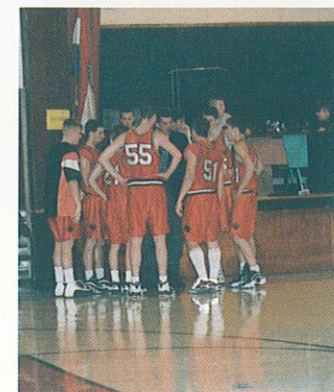

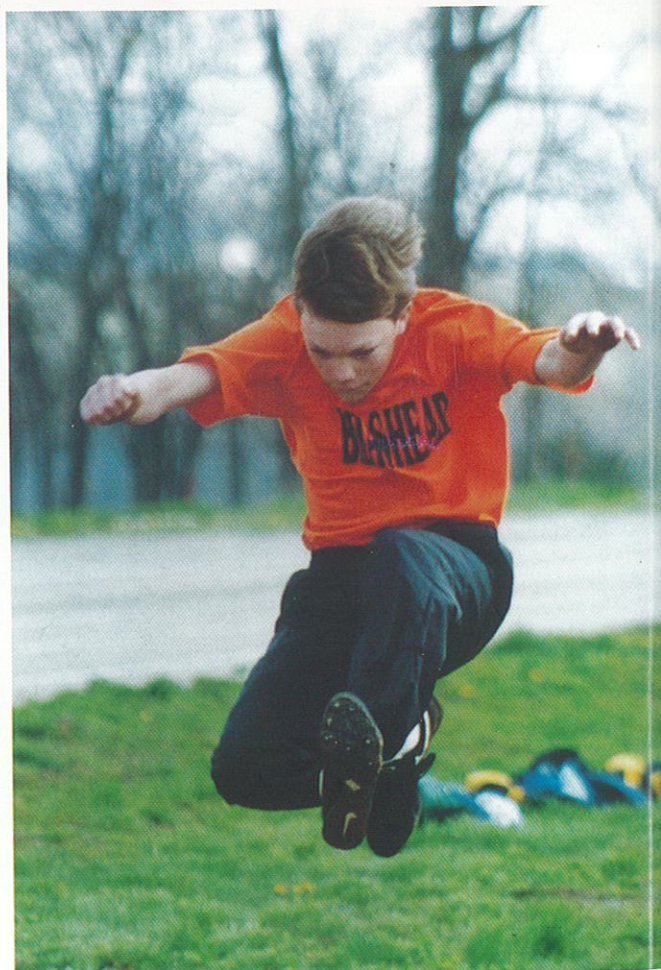

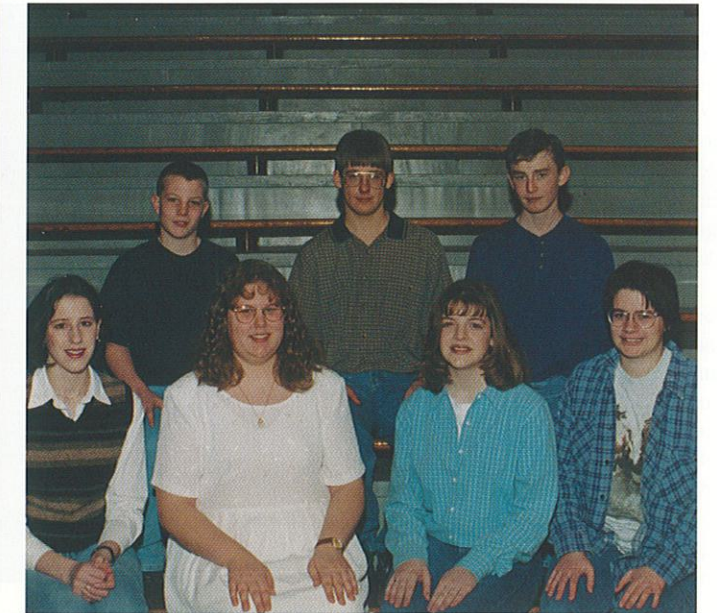

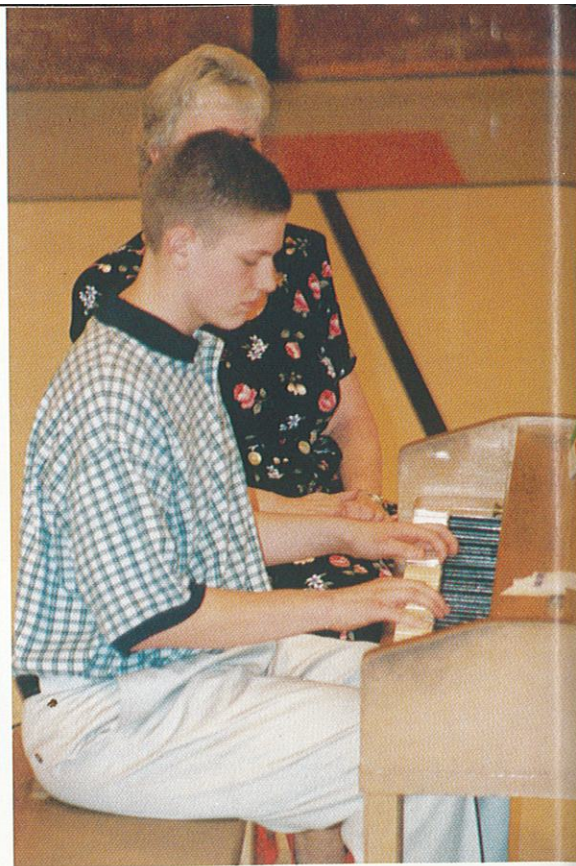

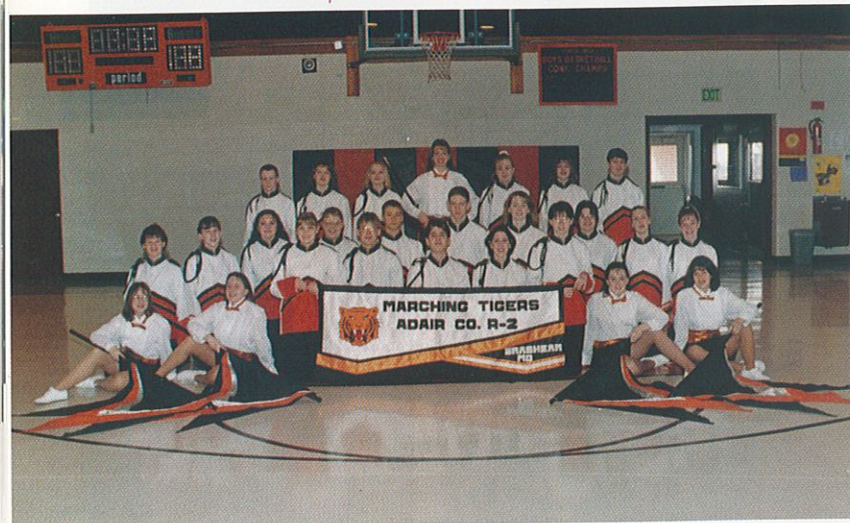

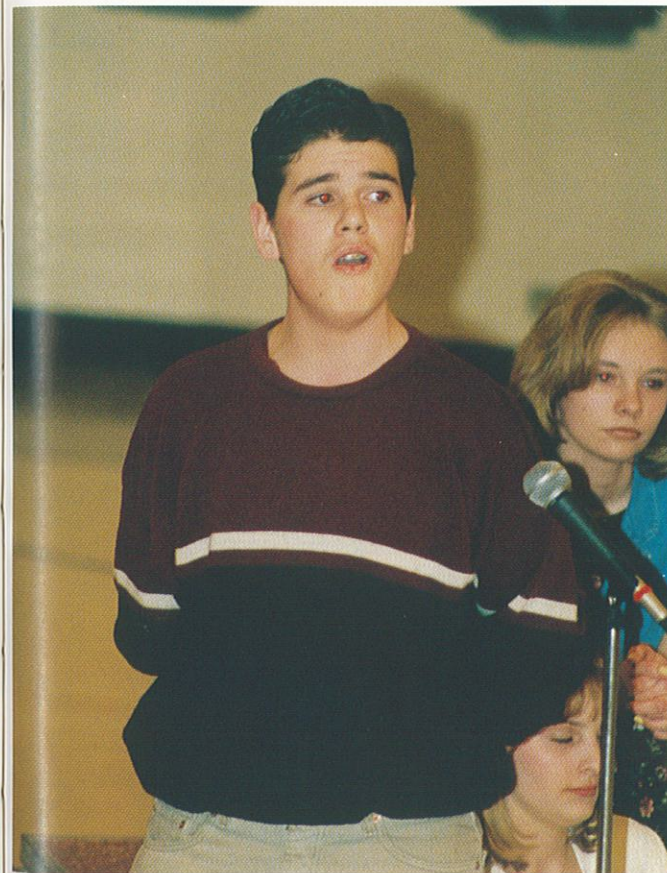

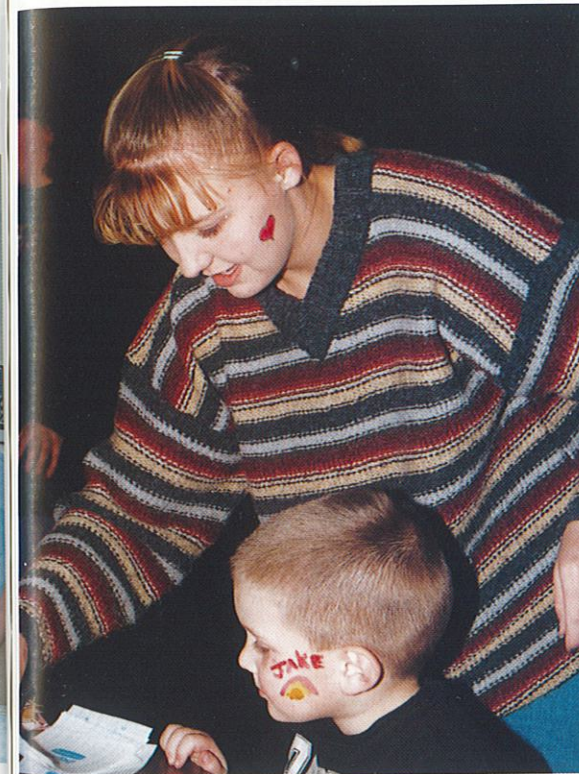
National Honor Society

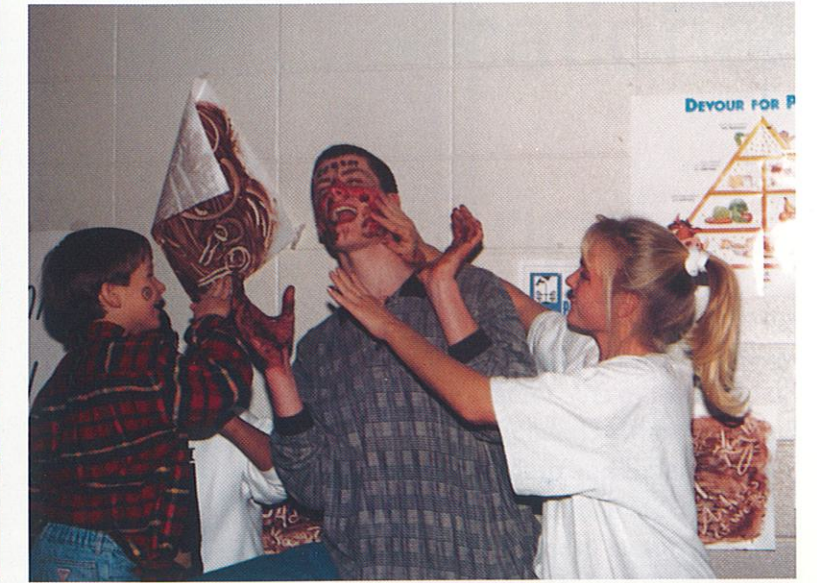

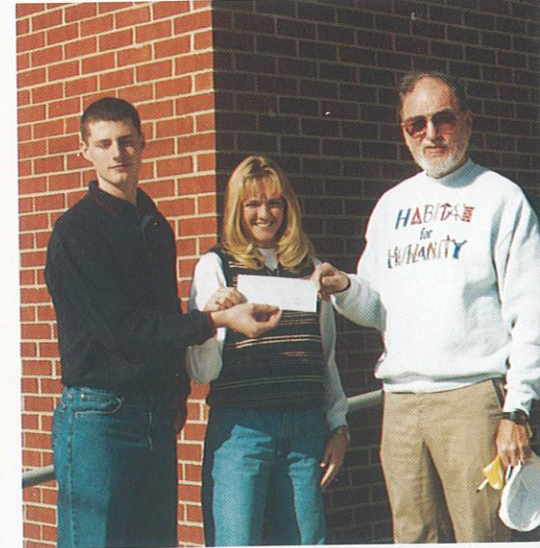

The Student Council sponsored all the dances this year. They attended a leadership camp with the NHS to Camp Jo-Ota and donated money to the family of Hannah Hartsock..

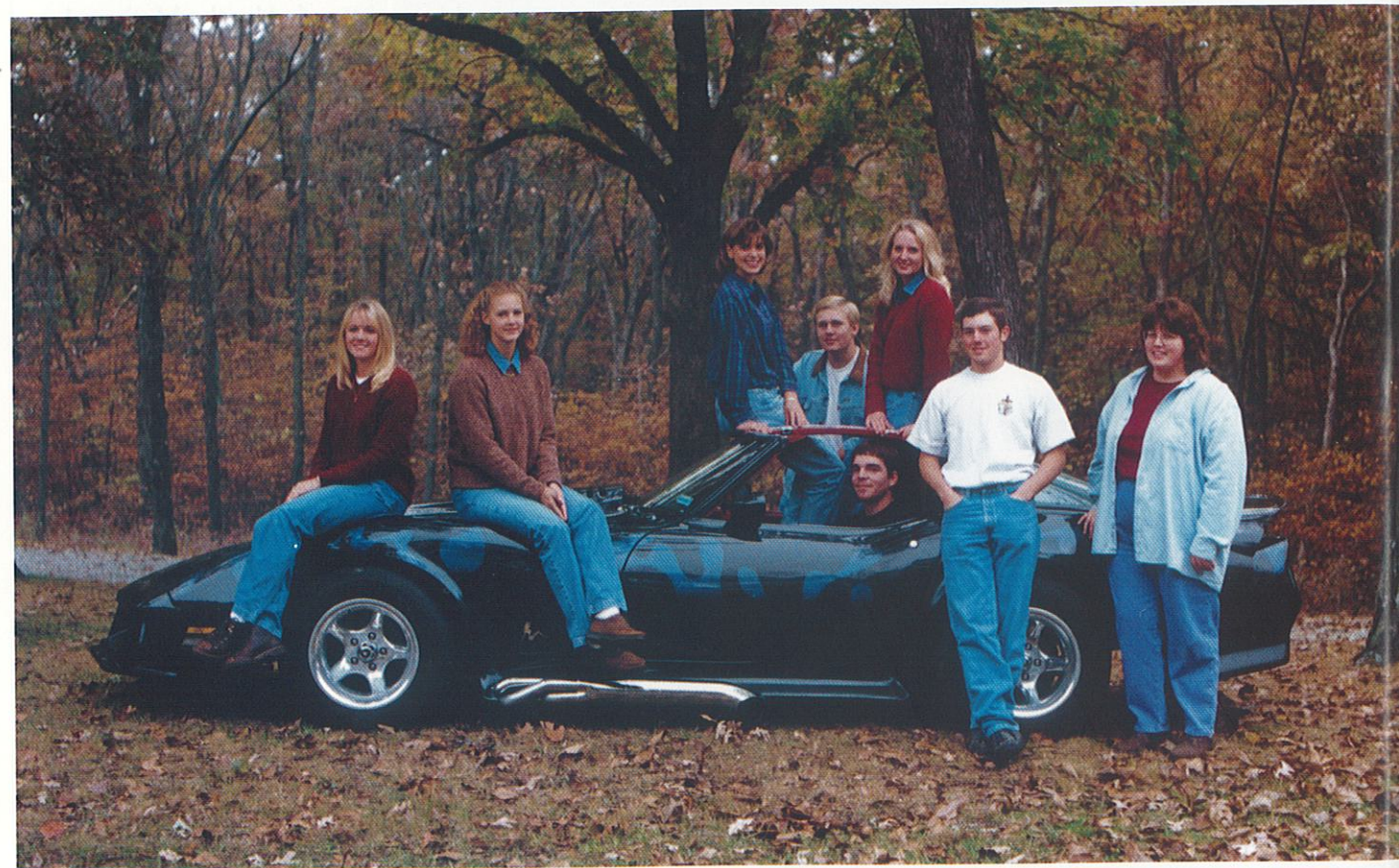
