Our students also show leadership in clubs. We coordinate activities and fundaisers. We set goals and make plans. We hold positions of office, and we pass he standard on to younger students.


On sports teams, more experienced players share their knowledge and nourage younger teammates. We show leadership by always giving our best, and always having a positive and encouraging attitude.








































In the Zone





Through the course of the junior high girls basketball season, the team learned some valuable lessons, such as the importance of working together, practicing to improve performance, and recognizing the areas where they needed more work. Hannah Reeves explained, "If we were on as a team, we pulled out a win. If we weren't working together, or if our attitudes were bad, we didn't play our best. We tried to build each other up and improve on our mistakes." In practice the girls worked on fundamentals and felt like they improved, especially at shots underneath the basket. In the locker room after the games, the team took time to discuss what went right and what went wrong. If they had lost the game, they talked more about what they needed to do differently in the next game. The freshman team members agreed that the younger members improved skills and demonstrated 50

leadership that they will need in the following season. An outstanding game of the season was the November 4th home game against Novinger. The Brashear girls made the first points in the game, but Novinger got ahead in the first quarter. By half time, and through most of the third and 4th quarters, Brashear fought to hold a two or three point lead. Then at the last second, a 3-point buzzer shot by Novinger tied the game. Brashear went on to outscore Novinger eight to four in the overtime, to win by a score of 40 to 36. The girls recalled the excitement of that game. 




Junior High Cheerleaders






Pump Up the Spirit





Eleven BHS band members made the Tri-County All-Conference Band. The All-Conference band performed at La Plata, Atlanta, and Bevier schools on March 11.





Average for boys: \$220




