


Yet, even a classic starts with something new, something different. A school year is the same way. It begins each fall with new schedules, new challenges and new opportunities.


BUILDING ON STICESS

When asked which game was the best, freshman Cody Mallet replied without hesitation. "The last game against







"You just need to know a wide variety of facts and information. Much of it is information that you pick up in various ways," said Ty Bushnell.







Right before Easter Break, S.H.OUT Club cleaned the patio garden. They cleaned out leaves and dead growth and sanded and finished picnic tables.






