






















After two months out of the building, the senior class returned on Thursday, May 14 for their last day of school.





The commencement ceremony for the class of 2020 was held on May 17 at 3:00 p.m. in the high school gymnasium.

With COVID-19 disrupting the end of the school year, most area schools canceled or postponed graduation ceremonies. Brashear decided to go ahead as planned. 


















50 Years in the Making


It was a year for crazy, quirky records to fall in sports:
