When the entire team was quarantined just days before the first scheduled game, there were doubts. "We wondered if this was what the school year was going to be," said junior Brandon Jochimsen.

Yet, they continued to prepare. The team had virtual practices while they were quarantined. "The coaches had us do workouts, like running, doing sit ups, and swinging a bat to build arm strength," said junior Lane Stutsman.

After the initial setback, the team was able to pick up as normal. They played the season-opening game at Novinger on September 15, and then continued on to play eight games for the season.

The home crowd showed up for home field games as well as traveled with the team to support them at away games. "That was another thing," said senior Garrett Housman, "We didn't know if spectators would be limited."

One strength of the team was that there were plenty of pitchers. Senior Garrett Housman had thrown many pitches from the mound in his high school career, and senior Austin Peterson had pitched a share of games. Junior Brandon Jochimsen also had considerable varsity experience. The freshman class brought Carson Erwin and Jack Reeves to the mound. Each pitcher had strengths and successes. On September 22, Housman pitched a shutout game against Atlanta, striking out 6 for a 12-0 win. The following week, on September 29, Jochimsen threw a two-hit shutout against Bucklin/Macon County. Jochimsen struck out 10 for the 10-0 win.

The point of the game, though, is to make it home. Fifty-five times in the season, the Tigers crossed home plate. "We lost more games than we won," said Housman, "but every win felt good, and every run felt good. We're just glad we got to play baseball."

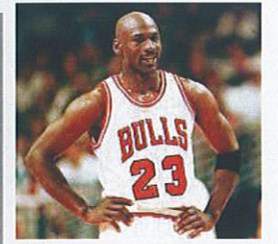

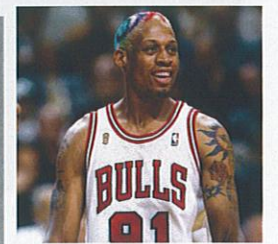

The junior high basketball season always goes by quickly; the games are played from start to finish within four or five weeks. Shortened even further because of outside circumstances, the boys only had the opportunity to play four games over the course of that short season.

The team played the season opening game at home against Atlanta on October 20. Three days later, they played again at Bucklin/Macon County. They played a close game, pulling away with the 38-33 win. On October 29, they faced Marion County at home. Behind at halftime, they picked up the pace but were unable to take the lead.

Then, they were forced to sit out for three weeks. The first cancelled game was the result of opponent teams being unable to play because of quarantines. Shortly, though, the quarantine hit the Tiger team. "During practice Mr. Brummit came in, sat us all down, and told us that we would have to be quarantined again because a team we had recently played had COVID," said freshman Jack Reeves.

"We figured it was going to happen, but it's never fun." Yet, the team made the most of it. They were disappointed, for sure, but knew it was out of their control. They were back in action for one more game, held on November 19 at Atlanta.

"We're just glad we got to play that last game. I wish it could have been more, but at least we felt like we ended the season," said freshman Clancy Noe. The Tigers fell to Atlanta 51-28, but there were some positive moments.

"In the final minutes, we knew we wouldn't be able to pull ahead, but we wanted to make the most of the last game. Coach did a great job making sure that everyone got to play," said Reeves.

Eighth-grader Cory Holcomb made a three-point shot near the end of the fourth quarter, his first points of the season. "It felt good," said Holcomb, "Everyone was cheering. It was a good way to end."

Three of the five games the junior high girls basketball team played were against a single opponent: Atlanta.

The Lady Tigers faced Atlanta to open their season at home, and then they repeated the match up to end the season with the last two games played back to back at Atlanta.

The first time Brashear faced Atlanta on the court, they fell 28 to 15. "We were just getting started," said eighth-grader Cassidy Althide, "They are an intimidating team."

After a few canceled games, the team faced Atlanta on

November 13. They brought the gap closer, scoring 16 points in the second half. They fell short by only three points, with the final score of 25-22.

Less than a week later, the team played Atlanta a final time on their court. This time, the result was different. The game was close, with Atlanta leading 8-6 at halftime. Brashear outscored Atlanta in the 2nd half and claimed the 20-18 win.

The team finished their season with three game wins and two losses.

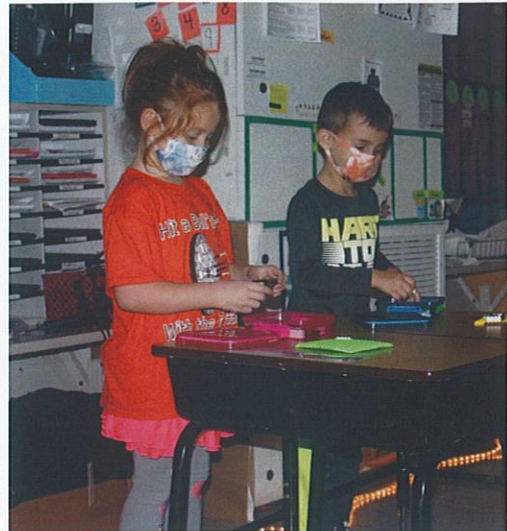

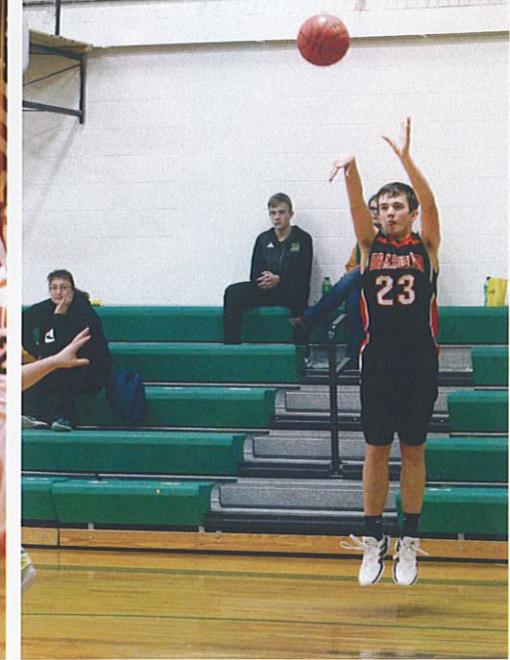


Junior Brandon Jochimsen jumps for the tip off to begin the game at La Plata on December 15.

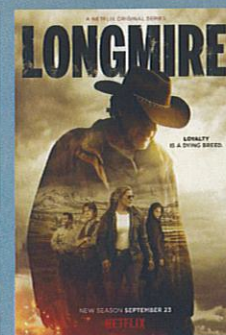

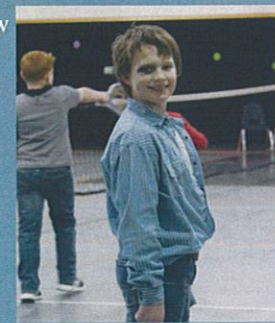

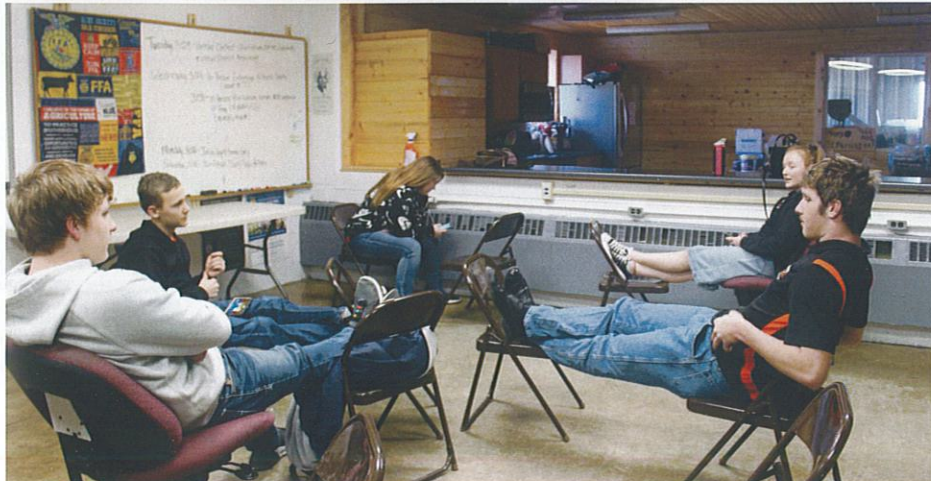

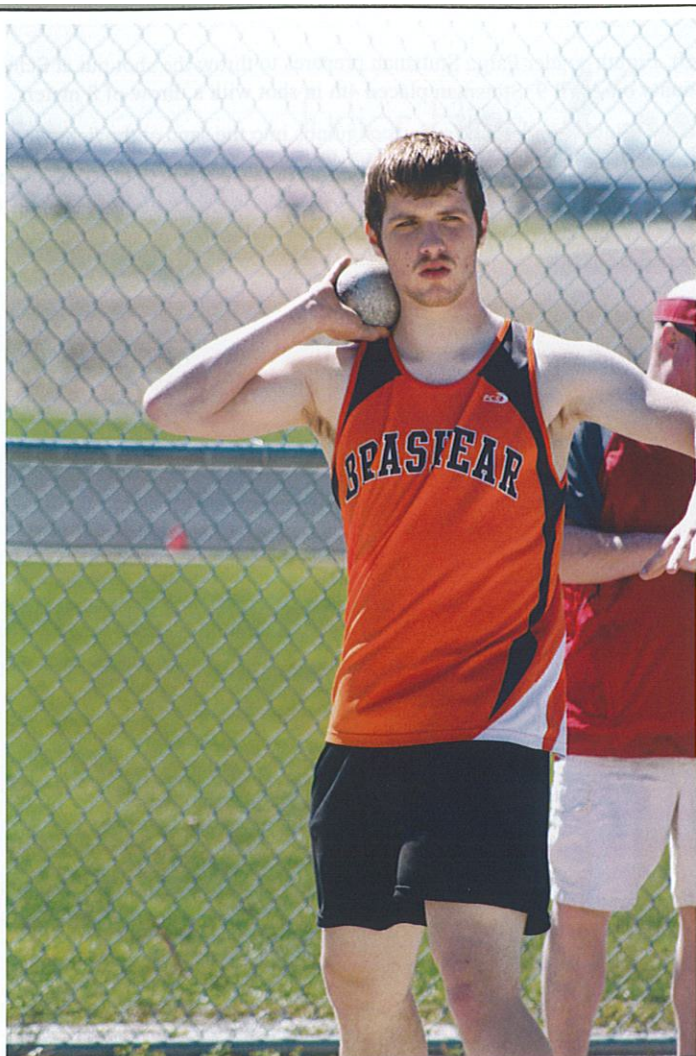

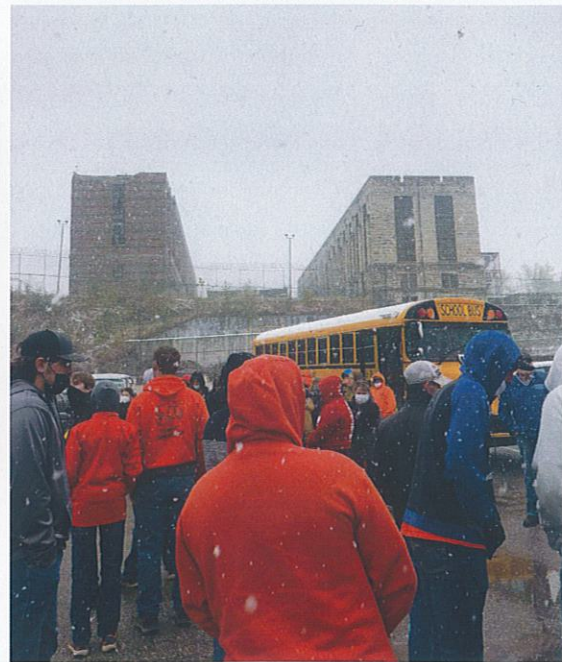

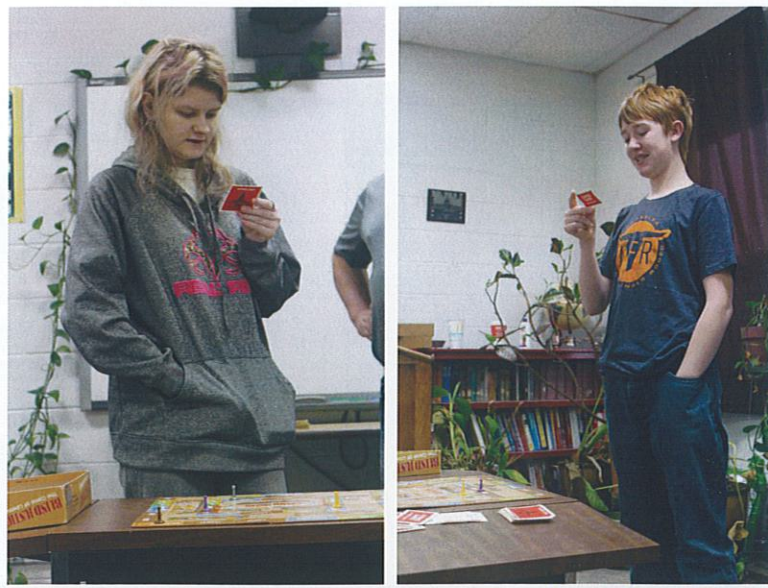

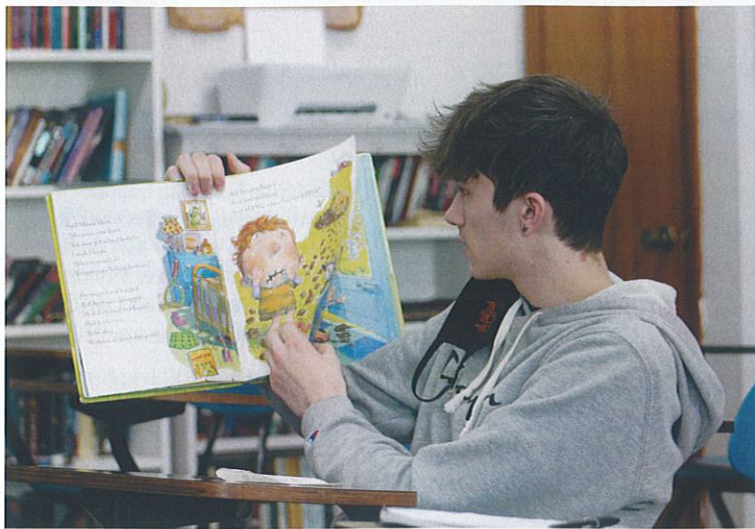

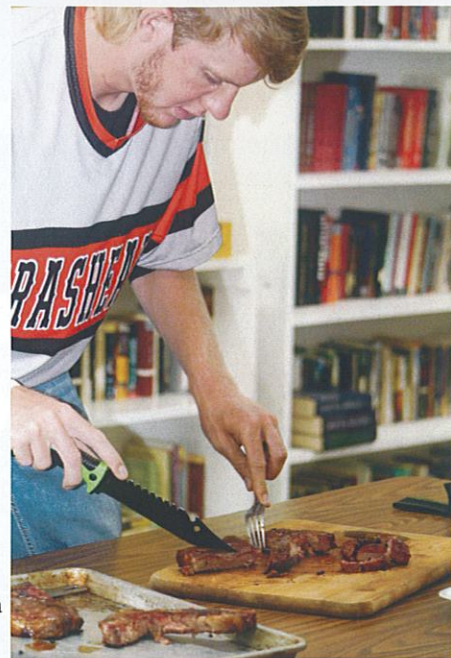

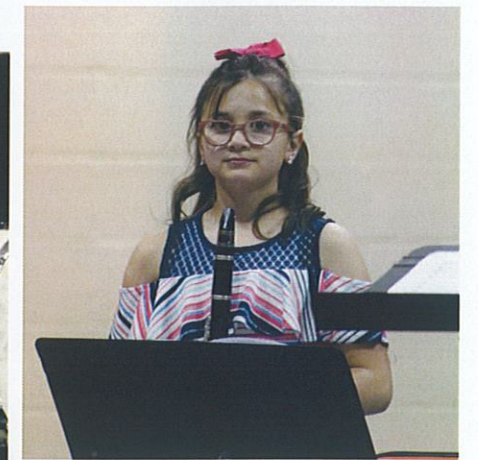

Prom and Afterprom shared a location, both held at Lost Branch Lodge. The dance was held in the large activity room, and Caraway Music Systems provided the music.

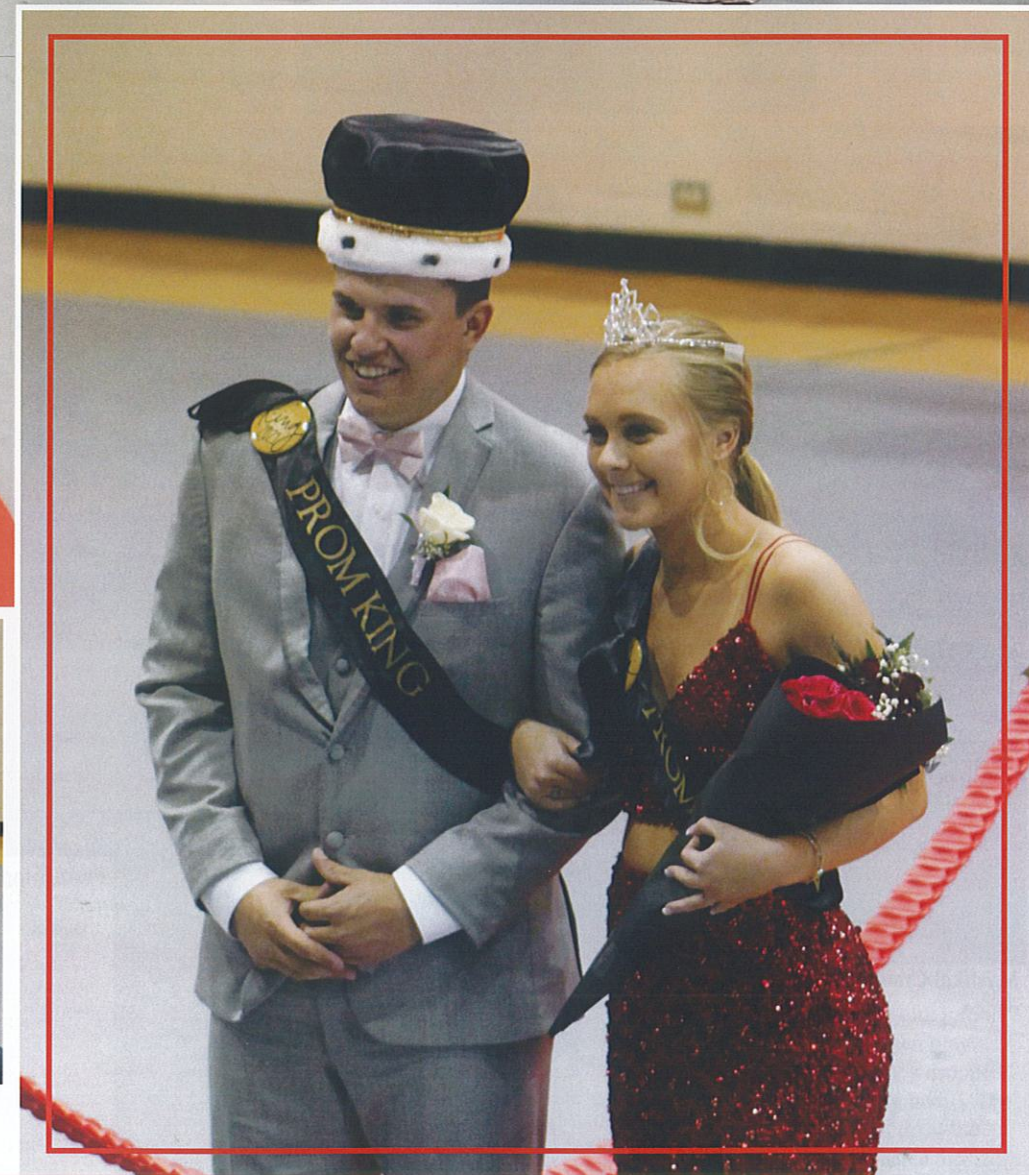
For Afterprom, junior and senior parents provided games, food, and prizes. Going along with the Prom theme, several games were card games or games of chance.

Other activities included a bonfire by the water, cornhole, and ladder golf.

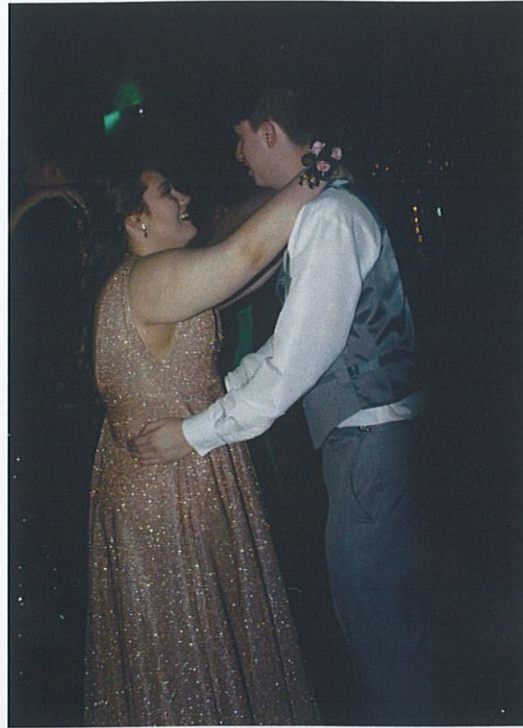

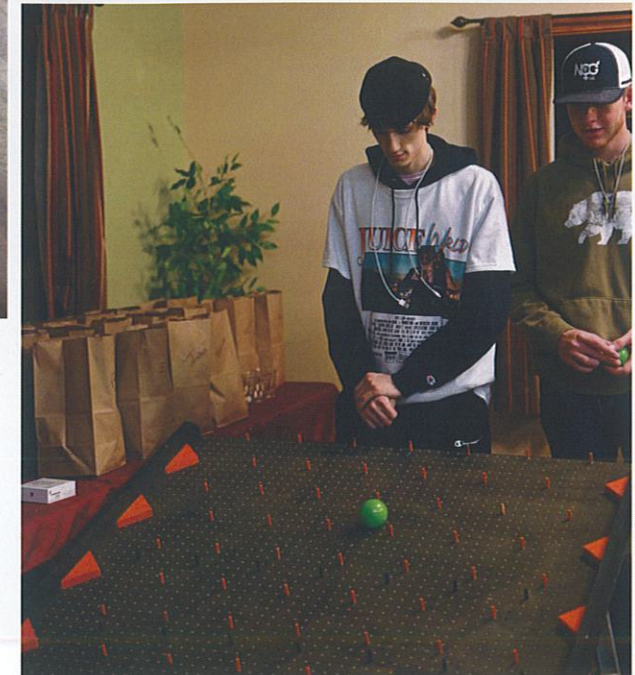

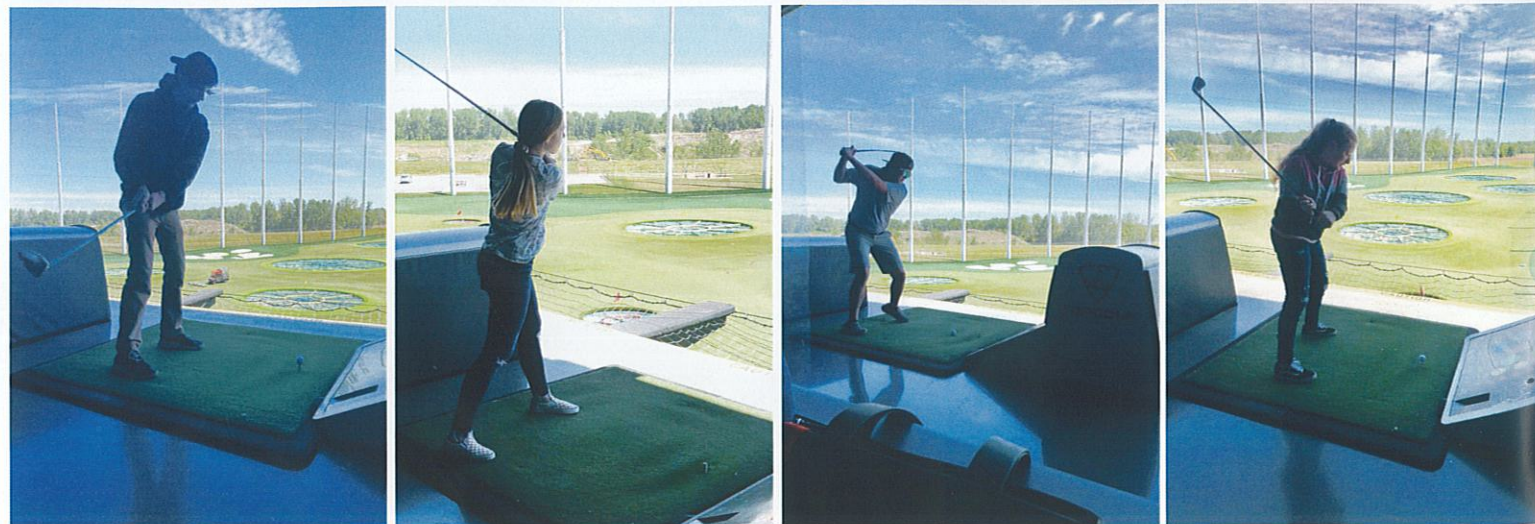

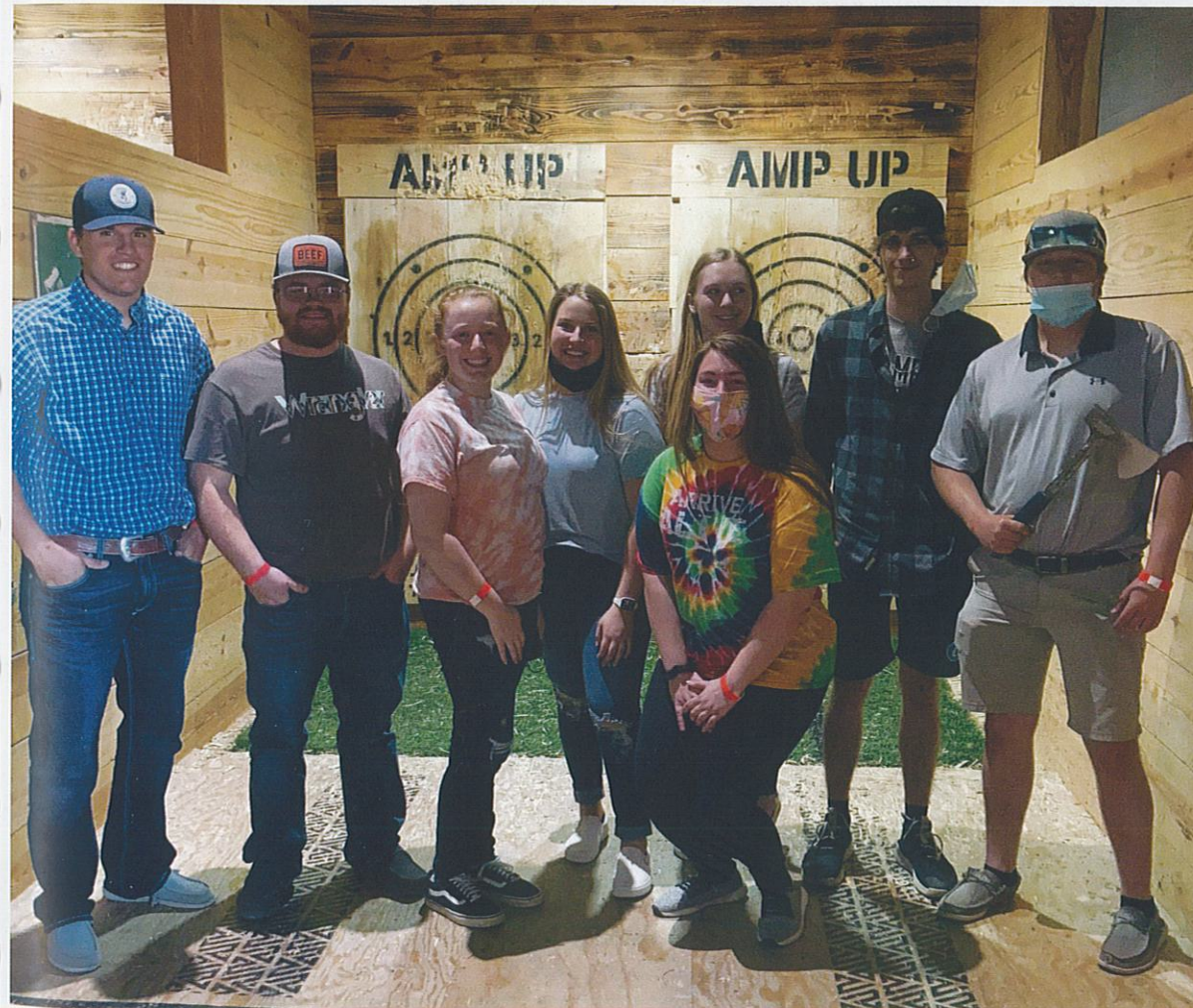

Scholarships were presented by committee representatives and Mrs. Hazen.



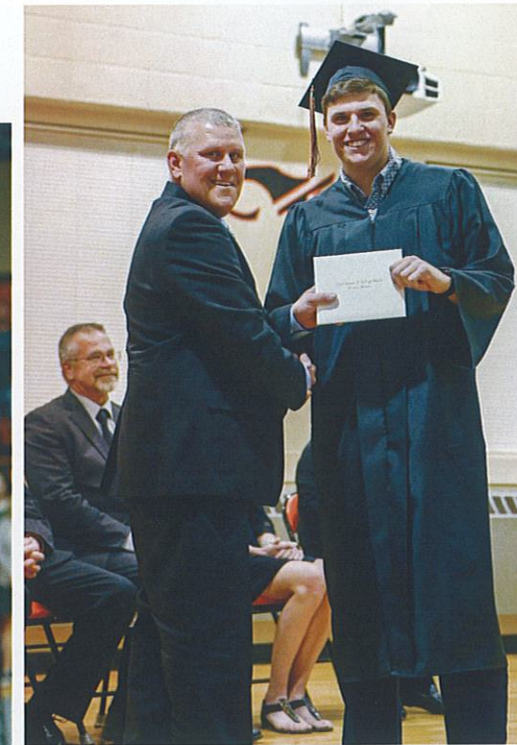
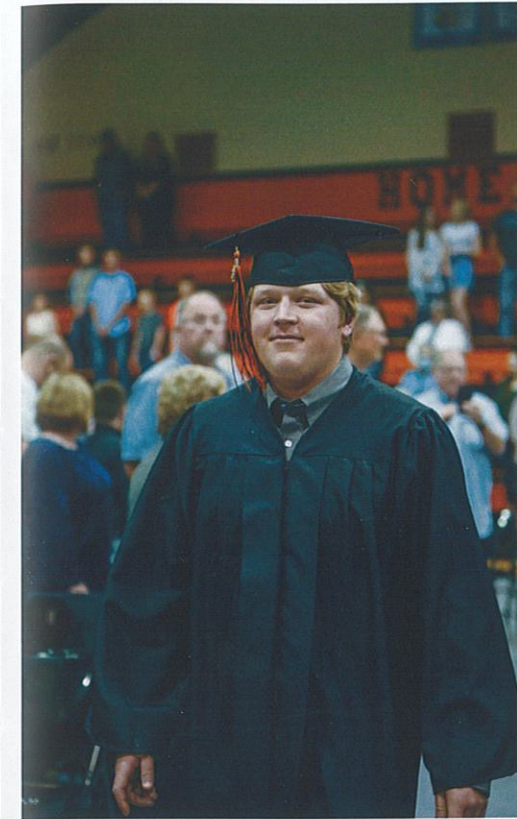
