In 1949, Brashear was shocked when it heard that one of its young hopefuls had lost his life in a tragic car wreck. Jimmy Ross was killed in an automobile accident, in Nebraska. His funeral was held at the Brashear School.



### "Record Crowd Attends Wedding..."

Mr. Donald S. Beerbower and Ms. Barbara A. Ross were married Thursday evening, February 26, 1953, at the Jaycee Merchandise Show at the Rieger Armory. A record crowd of some 3,500 people (the largest crowd ever to attend an event at the armory) witnessed the ceremony.

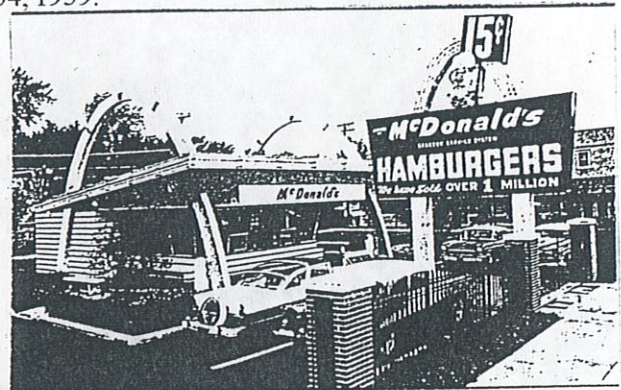

## Rosa Parks Breaks New Ground For African Americans

### "The Toast of the Town Debuts..."

In 1948...American fashion designer Donna Karen was born. Ed Sullivan's *The Toast of the Town* debuted and remained on the air for 23 years. Hit songs were *Buttons and Bows*, *It's a Most Unusual Day*, and *So in Love*.

### "Gone With the Wind author dies..."

In 1949...Author Margaret Mitchell died (*Gone With the Wind*). Actress Meryl Streep was born. The first Volkswagon arrived for sale in the U.S. NATO (North Atlantic Treaty Organization) formed by U.S., Canada, and ten western European countries. U.S. president's salary raised to \$100,000; vice president's raised to \$30,000.

### "Segregation Banned..."

In 1950...American politician Hattie Ophelia Wyatt Caraway died. President Truman banned segregation in the armed forces. National Council of Churches was established.

### "Massive Floods Cause Huge Loss..."

In 1951...Massive flooding of Mississippi River Valley caused over \$1 billion in losses. American Astronaut Sally Ride was born. American designer Lane Bryant was born. Six months after its debut, *I Love Lucy* had bumped Milton Berle's show from the top spot in the ratings on CBS. Television reached 17 million living rooms airing shows such as: *The Honeymooners*, *Father Knows Best*, *Leave It To Beaver*, and *The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriett*. Trading stamps caught on as a sales incentive. Popular on TV: *The Red Skelton Show* and *I Love Lucy*.

### "It's A Bird, It's A Plane, No It's Superman..."

In 1952...George Reeves played *Superman* on TV. British fashion designer Katherine Hamnett was born. Grace Kelly, Debbie Reynolds, and Donald O'Connor starred in *Singing In the Rain*. The standard version of the Bible was revised.

### "Mrs. Jacqueline Bouvier Kennedy..."

In 1953...Model/Artist Christie Brinkley was born. John F. Kennedy married Jacqueline Bouvier.

### "Get with the program, get with Oprah..."

In 1954...American Talk Show Host/Actress Oprah Winfrey was born. Judy Garland was nominated for an Academy Award for "*A Star Is Born*."

### "M-I-C-K-E-Y MOUSE..."

In 1955...actress Theda Bara died. *Mickey Mouse Club* premiered. Davy Crockett's famous coonskin cap became the desire of all kids. Hit Songs: *Maybellene*, *Ballad of Davy Crockett*, and *Yellow Rose of Texas*.

### "COOKIES, COOKIES, COOKIES..."

In 1956...American cookie maker Mrs. Debbie Fields was born. Rosa Parks rode legally in the front of a Montgomery bus (December 21).

### "Jerry Lee Lewis Does A Whole Lot Of Shaken..."

In 1957...American basketball player Carol Blazejowski was born. Milwaukee Braves defeated New York Yankees in the World Series, 4 games to 3. Hit Songs: *Tammy*, *Love Letters in the Sand*, *Young Love*, *Wake Up Little Susie*, and *Whole Lotta Shaken Going On*.

### "Material Girl Born..."

In 1958...Singer/actress Madonna was born. Golfer Arnold Palmer wins his first Masters Tournament. Popular on TV: *Laurence Welk*, *Playhouse 90*, *Maverick*, and *The Pat Boone Show*

### "I'm a Barbie girl, in my Barbie world..."

In 1959...American singer Billie Holliday died. Barbie came out in stores. Marilyn Monroe, Tony Curtis, and Jack Lemmon star in "*Some Like it Hot*."

### Brashear Builds New Building

The 60's decade was a time of change for the small town of Brashear. The decade started out with the consolidation of the Oak Dale, Paul Town, and Gopher Hill districts into the Brashear district in 1960. With the new students coming in, the school district had to build a new high school complex, located west of the elementary building, in 1963 and 1964. The class of 1965 was the first to have classes in this new building. The new high school had a gym, locker rooms, office space, kitchen, stage, and three classrooms.

Brashear High School said goodbye to the long-time superintendent Rene Hunt who retired in 1968 after 22 years of employment at Brashear. In 1969, the students traveled to Kirksville, MO for a banquet held at the Shamrock Inn instead of having the banquet at school. The students then returned to Brashear for the dance.

There was not only a strict dress code at dances, but also during regular school hours. A shirt was to be tucked in while at school. Girls had to wear their hair short. The school required girls to cut their hair if it was too long.

After school the popular activities were sports and band. The band was much larger than it is today because it was uncool not to be in band. Before and after school activities, kids would hangout at Earl and Reba Platz's restaurant, located on the south side of the square. High schoolers would grab a bite to eat, play pinball and pool, or just talk. On weekends everyone went to the Kirksville Drive-In to catch a flick. A hot movie that was popular with Brashear teens was Love Story starring Ryan O'Neill, the local heartthrob of Brashear girls, and Ali McGraw, who was the female star of the film. Any movie with Clint Eastwood was also a big hit with the Brashear students.

These are a few of the favorite things which made Brashear unique during the 1960's.

### Brashear Win Regional '62

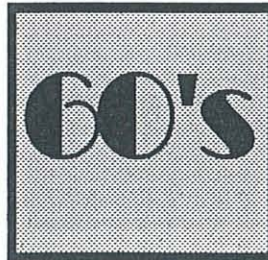
The sports records of Brashear High School were relatively vague because team records were not as well-publicized as they are today. The high school varsity boys basketball team won the Class S State Regional Basketball game. The Brashear Tournament was not held in the 62-63 and 63-64 school year because the tournament outgrew its facilities. Among the most popular of the 60s sports were baseball and basketball, track was next in line.

### Kansas City Makes It To Superbowl I

In 1967, the first Superbowl game was held. Missouri's own Kansas City Chiefs was the first team to make it to Superbowl I, but didn't come out victorious because they lost to the Green Bay Packers 35-10.

In the 1960 Summer Olympics in Rome, Cassius Clay won the light-heavyweight gold medal. Later in 1964, he picked off Liston to become the heavyweight champion of the world after he was quoted as saying he would "float like a butterfly and sting like a bee." The name Cassius Clay may not sound familiar because in 1964 the heavyweight champion became known as Muhammad Ali after he became a follower of the Nation of Islam.

Many other records were broken during the 1960's. Some of these were the 100 point record scored by Wilt Chamberlain in 1962 and the win of Jack Nicholas at the 1962 U. S. Open. In the National Basketball Association (NBA) the Boston Celtics were the hot team in the 1960s, winning eight world titles. In baseball, the sensation was Los Angeles Dodgers pitcher Sandy Koufax. In football Jim Brown of the Cleveland Browns and quarterback Johnny Unitas of the Baltimore Colts were the top players.

## Dallas: Kennedy Assassinated

The nation grieved when President John Fitzgerald Kennedy was assassinated on November 22, 1963, in Dallas, Texas. This came as a shock to many Americans because they loved the young Jack Kennedy. JFK was not the only respected leader whose life was tragically ended. Americans said goodbye to Martin Luther King Jr. in 1967. Eleanor Roosevelt, the wife of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt passed on in 1963. Marilyn Monroe was an actress/model who also passed away in 1962.

During the 1960s, the racial problem increased which increased the number of civil rights activists. Among the famous activists was Martin Luther King Jr. In front of the Lincoln Memorial on August 28, 1963, King delivered his famous "I Have a Dream" speech. Because of his peaceful demonstrations, Martin Luther King Jr. was the youngest recipient to be awarded The Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 at the age of 35. King was truly one of the civil rights heroes of the 1960s. It was a victory for African Americans when Thurgood Marshall was inducted as the first black National Supreme Court Justice in 1967.

The phrase, "That's one small step for man and one giant leap for mankind," was a very important part of 1960s history. These words were spoken by Neil Armstrong on July 21, 1969, just as he became the first man to step on the surface of the moon. Another important event of the sixties was the controversy of the US involvement in Vietnam.



## Batman and Sesame Street Debut in the 60's

There were many popular movies, shows, and songs which made the 1960s a special decade. Many new shows debuted and music groups became famous.

In 1966 *Batman* debuted and became a huge success during the three years it aired. Kids would watch faithfully every week to see Batman, Robin, and Batgirl fight villains like the Riddler, Joker, the Penguin, and Catwoman. The children also became familiar with Big Bird, Oscar the Grouch, Bert and Ernie, and the Cookie Monster; these were a few of the characters which children adored when *Sesame Street* debuted in 1969. Little Joe, Hoss, Adam, and Ben became well-known names with the top show of the 60s, *Bonanza*. Daytime television in the 60s consisted of the popular soap opera *General Hospital*, which debuted in 1963, and the talk show *Phil Donahue*, which debuted in 1967.

Another favorite past time of Americans was going to the movie theater. Many hit movies premiered during the 1960s. Alfred Hitchcock was a very popular director with many of his movies becoming successful. Hitchcock was the director of the thrillers *The Birds* and *Psycho*. *The Sound of Music* was one of the most beloved musicals of the 60s.

Many hit songs were written by artists in the 1960s. A few of them were the songs *Itsie Bitsie*, *Teenie Weenie*, *Yellow Polka Dot Bikini*, which was a hit song in 1960. The Beatles were at the height of their fame in the 1960s, especially after the hit song *I Wanna Hold Your Hand* in 1964. The Fab Four became one of the most popular groups of all time in the 60s.

Elvis Presley was a rising star of the sixties. He melted the hearts of women around the world and made them go wild whenever they caught a glimpse of him.

## Explosion Destroys Brashear United Methodist Church

**1970** Brashear High School had a boy's and girl's glee club. The boy's club consisted of 16 boys and the girl's club consisted of 22 girls.

### Brashear Housing Unit Begins

**1971** The senior class trip to the Lake of the Ozarks offered water skiing, go-cart racing, and an opra. Construction for the Brashear Housing Unit was started.

### # 1 Lady Tigers

**1972** Coach Tom Roberts led the varsity girls team to a 28-1 record and to a first place victory in every tournament. His team held conference champs two years straight. Roberts supervised the first Missouri girls basketball camp. Brashear celebrated its 100 year centennial.

**1973** The Brashear High School organizations consisted of Young Engineers and Scientists, FHA, Honor Society, Student Council, Journalism, Mixed Chorus, A and B Band, and Parent Teacher Association.

### Explosion in Church

**1974** After an explosion in the Brashear United Methodist Church, a fire erupted in the basement and destroyed the church.

**1975** The new United Methodist Church building was finished. Brashear had a jazz band. The theme of the annual fashion show was "Day at the Farm." There were a variety of outfits including outfits from the early 1920's.

**1976** The Brashear junior class organized the plays "Pancakes" and "Wildcat Willie Gets the Woolies" to raise money for their class. The construction of the Brashear Community Bible Church was finished.

### Mrs. Neva Sleeth Retires

**1977** The Voc Tech program began in Brashear and consisted of seven boys. The first Brashear High School Pom Pon squad consisted of seven girls. After teaching grades 4, 5, and 6 for twenty-six years in Brashear, Mrs. Neva Sleeth retired.

### Brashear School and Community Newspaper Comes Back to Life

**1978** This newspaper was distributed to all homes in the school district and was funded by advertising from businesses in the area. The newspaper staff also published a school newspaper that was sold to students at a cost of 10 cents per issue.

**1979** The Sweetheart Queen and King were Lynn Smith and Doug Thomas. Yearbook Queen and King were Lori Smith and Russel Noe. Yearbook Princess and Prince were Rebecca Morehouse and David Mountain.

## Elvis Presley Dies at Age 42

### New York Mets Win World Series

**1970** The first contingent of 25,000 American troops left Vietnam. Final rites for General Dwight Eisenhower, WWII hero and 34th president, were held at Washington National Cathedral. The famous rock group the Beatles broke up.

**1971** The 26th Amendment was ratified, giving 18 year olds the right to vote. The Supreme Court upheld the ruling to integrate public schools.

### Joe Frazier Knocks Out Muhammad Ali

**1972** Apollo 15 astronauts drove their Lunar Rover vehicle in exploring the moon's topography. Louis Armstrong made his debut around the world as a jazz trumpeter. The John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts opened with Leonard Bernstein's "Mass" performance. Sixteen-year-old Chris Evert became the youngest female winner of the Wightman Cup.

### Rolling Stones Top Charts

**1973** Buck Owens and Roy Clark were the stars in country-western music. Apollo 17 astronauts made their third exploration of the moon. Mark Spitz, an American swimmer, set an Olympic record and won seven gold medals. Bobby Fischer was the first American world chess champion. The Vietnam cease-fire was signed in Paris, and the last American troops left Vietnam.

### Patty Hurst Kidnapped

**1974** "Streaking" became a popular prank. Watergate scandal came into focus. The House Judiciary Committee

voted to impeach Nixon who then resigned allowing Gerald Ford to become the 38th president with Nelson Rockefeller as vice president. President Ford pardons Nixon unconditionally for federal crimes and possible federal crimes committed in the Watergate cover-up.

### Jack Nicklaus Wins Fifth Masters Title

**1975** America's Apollo 18 linked up with the Soviets' Soyuz 19. The astronauts and cosmonauts held a joint news conference in space.

### Jimmy Carter Elected 39th President

**1976** Barbara Walters became the first woman news anchor to make a \$1 million deal.

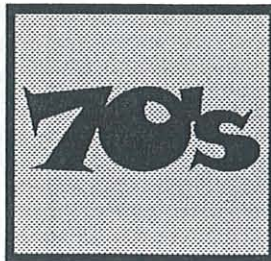
**1977** Human rights became a cornerstone of President Jimmy Carter's foreign policy. A blackout in New York City left 9 million people without electricity for up to 25 hours. The first capital punishment in the U.S. since 1967 was done by a firing squad in Utah to Gary Gilmore.

1985 *The Golden Girls* is the new TV show. Bruce Springsteen's *Born in the USA* was the top selling album.

1986 *Top Gun* with Tom Cruise was the big movie. Oprah went national.

1987 *Fatal Attraction* premiered. Michael Jackson's *Bad* sold 25 million records. Madonna had 10 straight top ten singles.

1988 The new TV shows were *Murphy Brown* and *Roseanne*. *Phantom of the Opera* opened on Broadway.

1989 *Born on The Fourth of July* and *Batman* hit the big screen and *Coach* was a popular new television show

1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul, Korea. Winter Olympics in Calgary, Canada. U.S. took home six gold metals. Dodgers defeated A's in the World Series.
